26Jerri Smith: 27	[0:46] And your seniority date?
28Diana Valenta: 29	Fisher Body is, uh, '83. [<mark>Corporate Times</mark> 0:55] '81.
30Jerri Smith:	Okay. [0:57] And what department did you first hire in to?
31 32Diana Valenta: 33	<mark>C Trim</mark> . It's, uh, yeah, C Trim. Second shift.
34Jerri Smith: 35	[1:04] Do you know what job you had?
36Diana Valenta: 37	Yes I do. I had started out as, uh, anyway, I was on station wagons.
38Jerri Smith: 39	[1:19] Any particular job?
40Diana Valenta: 41 42 43 44 45	Yeah, I had to, oh yeah, I had to put the racks, build the racks up, put'm up on top a the car. Had to crawl inside the car and do a couple wires and crawl in the back of the tailgate and put some stuff up on it, in it, and then I had to turn around and get back up on the car and screw down the, the luggage rack things.

16	while, and I did [inaudible 2:16] line. Did [mizaline] up there, which is a
17	place where it's air conditioned and it's clean and do mostly sanding and
18	stuff of up there, it's easy jobs. And I was in the Body Shop and I cannot
19	tell you the jobs, I can't remember it, but it was an awful job. And then I've
20	also been in the Skill Center, these last two years.

22Jerri Smith:	Doreen?

24Doreen Howard:	[2:38] Um, you've talked about two different seniority dates. Can you
25	explain why you have two different seniority dates?
26	
27Diana Valenta:	Yes. I hired in to Oldsmobile, and I worked over there for not quite a year.
28	And then we got laid off due to a cutback. And I was out of work for like
29	17 months. And then Fisher Body happened to call me because they
30	needed people and asked me if I would like to come to work for them,
31	which I did. And then they wanted to know if I wanted to back to
32	Oldsmobile, and I told'm no way, I was stayin' here. So and that's how I
33	ended up with two seniority dates.

35Doreen Howard:	[3:13] And that was Olds in Lansing?
36	
37Diana Valenta:	Yes.

39Doreen Howard:	[3:16] Okay. I noticed on your sheet that it said you were born in Flint?

43Doreen Howard:	[3:22] How did you happen to come to Lansing then?
44 45 Diana Valenta:	Wall I'm not even from Elipt: I was just have goin' through Elipt in a ser
45Diana Valenta:	Well I'm not even from Flint; I was just born goin' through Flint in a car.

4 5Diana Valenta: 6 7	My parents were just drivin' through, and I came two weeks early. Actually I'm from Houghton Lake.
8Doreen Howard: 9 10 11 12	[3:40] Okay. So when you came to Fisher Body, you had already worked at another plant. What were your thoughts that very first day that you came in to our plant, um, what were your thoughts about the plant in comparison to where you came from?
13Diana Valenta: 14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21	Well compared from Fisher Body to Olds at that time back in '83, I gotta tell ya, I worked in Final Assembly over at Oldsmobile, which is very hard work. And we had ta use big guns [inaudible 4:10] seatbelts and stuff we had to do plus other stuff. When I first come to Fisher Body, my first thought was people told me how hard they worked, and I said you don't know how lucky you are that you ain't workin' as hard as they do over at the Final Assembly over at Olds. But then that all changed when Olds took over the whole things, then we were all workin' hard.
22Jerri Smith:	[4:33] Jerri Smith. Uh, have you been in any strikes?
23 24Diana Valenta: 25 26 27	Yes, I have. We had one strike that [inaudible 4:38] or two, I can't remember. Anyway, I know one for a fact that we come down to and it was only, it only lasted a day or so and then they, that was the end of it so we didn't get paid for comin' down here and picketing.

31Diana Valenta: 32 33	Had somethin' to do with the contract. I can't remember. That's been a few, quite a few years ago.
34Jerri Smith: 35 36	[5:04] And also why did you hire in to Fisher Body? Just because of the layoff?
37Diana Valenta: 38	'Cause they called me.

They ca-, I interviewed at Fisher Body back in the 60s, and so, but the place I worked at the time was getting mad because they were losin' all their people to GM, so they wouldn't let us go. They were tellin'm stuff so they wouldn't hire us.

13	do fundraisers for different people that had problems or different things

16	dinners do, can you think of that you did and for what reasons did you do
17	a lot of'm?
18 10Diana Walanta	Mall I don't know a superior has a many I a sector should be hast I know as a did
19Diana Valenta:	Well I don't know exactly how many I was involved it, but I know we did
20	one big dinner for Oklahoma bombing that time for Oklahoma. And Bruce
21	[McConnell 6:11] and I got together and did that one, organized it.
22	Everybody helped – don't get it wrong, we didn't do it by ourselves.
23	Everybody, all the employees pitched in and donated food and stuff so we
24	could have it. So this was not just a two-person deal. And then we did ice
25	cream socials like four or five times, and we took that money from the ice
26	cream socials we had out there and we split the money and we gave half of
27	it like to the [Inaudible 6:35] School so to help them out with, uh,
28	playground equipment or whatever they needed, and we took half and we
29	usually give to, uh, to, uh, an organizations to help with gloves and hats
30	and stuff for the wintertime for the kids that needed it. And then we also
31	did one and we sent the money to Feed the Children, which is a big
32	organization that they take care of the hungry families here in the U.S.
33	
34Jerri Smith:	Doreen [<mark>inaudible</mark> 7:01].
35	
36Doreen Howard:	So it sounds like you were involved in quite a few, uh, community
37	projects
38	
39Diana Valenta:	Right.
40	
41Doreen Howard:	and activities. [7:09] Was that all through your union activity?
42	[<mark>Inaudible</mark>].
43	
44Diana Valenta:	No, this was the stuff that we did on our own.
45	
46Doreen Howard:	This was all [<mark>inaudible</mark> 7:15].

2Diana Valenta:	This is stuff that we decided to do on our own. And we did a couple more.
3	Now Connie Swander and I did a, one or two for a person that was, I think
4	in the Body Shop at that time or Skill Trades. I can't remember where they
5	were, but they had a problem in their family. Cancers and stuff, so we did
6	one to help them out. No but this was [inaudible 7:32], you know, I'm a
7	union person, but most of this was in the plant where we, uh, just took it
8	upon ourselves to have these to help our fellow workers out and their
9	families. But then I also always helped the union with, uh, the [gate 7:46]
10	collections for like the Old NewsBoy, uh, Toys for Tots, and I've done the
11	United Way 'cause I've done the community service committee for a
12	while.
13	
14Jerri Smith:	Jerri Smith, um, [8:00] what other committees were, have you been on in
15	the union?
16	
17Diana Valenta:	I've been on the election committee, and I'm on the recreation committee.
18	
19Michael Fleming:	Mike Fleming. [8:00] Tell us a little bit about the elections committee. I
20	think that was a special one for you, wasn't it?
21	
22Diana Valenta:	What do you mean by special?
23	
24Michael Fleming:	[8:19] Did you have a particular role [<mark>inaudible</mark>]?

26Diana Valenta:	Well w-, I did, the, for, uh, I mean I was just a regular committee person
27	[inaudible 8:23] but then I was a chairperson for a while. And now I'm,
28	I'm still on the committee but just as a committee person.
29	
30Michael Fleming:	[8:32] A, a, as a chairperson, uh, what were some of your responsibilities?
31	How did that work for you as the elections committee?
32	
33Diana Valenta:	The elections committee worked pretty good for me. I had a really good
34	committee, and that helps. You're only as good as the committee you got
35	behind ya. I don't care who ya are, you're only as good as the people that
36	working with you. And I happen to be very lucky. I had a very good
37	committee behind me that helped me through every step if I needed it.
38	And my, some of my, uh, responsibilities was I had to make sure to get the
39	elections lined up, the dates, the times. Make sure the people got to sign
40	up. They had to get that posted and take the postings down and all that
41	stuff and get my committee organized to, uh, to run the election and make
42	sure that the ballots are ready and they all [inaudible 9:15] right and stuff
43	like that.
44	
45Michael Fleming:	[9:19] Basically it sounds your organization skills [<mark>inaudible</mark>] it was, it
46	was pretty, pretty much a challenge [inaudible 9:22].

2Diana Valenta:	It was okay. I don't know why you call it challenging because I enjoyed it.
3	I, I really enjoyed it. So I guess it was a challenge too but I just enjoyed it
4	so, and I did feel good because I had people come up to me and, not to say
5	anything about anybody because I don't mean that, but they told me that I
6	
7	put the respect back in the elections committee, which made me feel good.
8Michael Fleming:	[9:42] You know, you, you sound like a very, very strong union
9	individual. I'd like to ask you how many General Motors vehicles or
10	American-made vehicles have you had?
11	
12Diana Valenta:	All my life, I drove nothing but GM except one time. I had one Ford
13	because I had to buy it used because I needed a vehicle right then and
14	there. And it was an old station wagon, which was okay
15

18Diana Valenta:	but my dad always instilled in us kids to buy GM vehicles, and we did.
19	And our kids do today too. And our grandkids. They st-, they buy'm too.
20	
21Jerri Smith:	Jerri Smith again. [10:18] What do ya, what are your reactions to the name
22	changes of Fisher Body when it's gone from Fishy Bod-, Fisher Body to
23	BOC to LCA?
24	
25Diana Valenta:	Well if you want my honest opinion, I don't like it. Never did like it. I
26	think it should stay Fisher Body. I know we have to go on and we have to
27	move on different things, but I still always felt, the people that I talk to
28	that always told me they always look for that on the cars, body by Fisher,
29	and that always made them feel confident in buying it. And once that
30	changed, a lotta people was very upset about it.

32Jerri Smith:	[10:56] Do you, do you still refer to the plant as Fisher Body when you
33	speak to people or?

35Diana Valenta:	You know, I always say Fisher Body, and they know what I mean. If I say
36	BOC, they look at me, "What do you mean?" Fisher Body is it. It will be

40	could you, um, describe some of the things that make the people or our
40	facility different from Oldsmobile? What made us special compared to the

44Diana valenta. 45	Oldsmobile, and, um, management over there was not very good. They
46	didn't treat the people right. I mean, I know we have that here now,

I mean, the ones I had anyway. I don't know about anybody else's experience, but I was very fortunate that the supervisors I had when I first come here was excellent ta me. I mean, I had no problems any of'm. The only problem I had, and it's a joke today, because Cookie and I are very good friends, which is Eldridge Cook, and, uh, first time I ever laid eyes on this man, he come up to me, he says, "What's hapnin' mama," and I says, "I ain't your mama," and now we laugh about it. It's just a joke that's gone on all these years because I wasn't used to somebody talkin' to me like that so. You know, I was not from Lansing. I was from up north and, so we just didn't have that kinda talk. And so it threw me off at first, but like I said, Cookie and I we laugh about it every time we get together now. It's a joke between us. And management just helped me out. I mean they just was work with me and I had no problem. I mean, I had some supervisors that people told me they didn't like, that they were terrible supervisors, but you know what, I didn't have a problem with'm. I was straightforward with them and they were with me. We respected each other. That's what counts. [12:58] Doug Rademacher. Would you share with us, did you notice a difference in your union representation from the time you worked at the
22	Olds plant and when you came over to the Fisher Body plant? Did they
24	greet you at Fisher Body? Did you know who your union reps were? And
25	what was the environment as far as union representation?

27Diana Valenta:	Well, now you gotta remember, back in '81 was when I was at
28	Oldsmobile, and the union over there at that time was pretty good. They
29	actually were. I mean, I had a problem – see, I was a UAW member. I had
30	been a UAW member since back in the 60s. Every plant I've went to has
31	been UAW. Whether it was at GM or a different plant. I started out at
32 33	Gibson's in Greenville building refrigerators, that's UAW. So every plant I
34	went to has been UAW. So I've been there for 60 some-, since '63 in the union. And but I went over there to Oldsmobile and as an example, if
35	you'd like one, they were pickin' on me over there. I had a supervisor who
36	for some reason didn't like me. I did my job. I did it for over two weeks,
37	not a problem. All of a sudden he yanks me off my job, puts me on this
38	other job that nobody, even the relief men, could not do. Took two people
39	to do it, and he told me I had to do it by myself. Of course, I didn't have
40	my 90 days in, so you know you can't go to the union till you get your 90
41	days in. And, but somebody got word to the union what was goin' on, and
42	the union did come up and take care of it.
43 44	So back then the union was protty descent but it get warse as it want as
44 45	So back then, the union was pretty decent, but it got worse as it went, as far as I'm concerned, over there. Over here at Fisher Body, the union I've
46	got right now and the people that's in the union, I love'm to death. I think

28 29Diana Valenta: 30 31 32 33 34 35 36 37 38 39	Well, in the first place, the reason the, the plant in the Greenville is getting closed is because it's going to Mexico. So you don't really want my honest opinion on that on tape, but I'm tired of NAFTA and CAFTA and all this that's takin' all of our American jobs away from us and sendin' them overseas. And my feelings for Fisher Body, I re-, I really did not want to see it close, but I do understand that we do have to move on and we have to keep up with times whether we like it or not. And I'm one a these people that would rather keep it the way it was. But then they weren't makin' money and they had to do somethin' different to, to get back into the game. So I can understand it, just don't have ta like it.
