All right, we're at Edna Ramont's home and this is October 6 and we're going to be talking about REO memories and I'm going to start by asking, uh, Edna [0:22] where she was born and raised and where she went to school.	
12Edna Ramont: 13 14	Owosso, Michigan. I was born in 1916, July 10. And I went to school, Washington School, Bryant School, and the high school, that's it.	
15Shirley Bradley: 16	And that was in Owosso.	
17Edna Ramont: 18	Yeah.	
19Shirley Bradley: 20	[0:42] And when did you, uh?	
21Edna Ramont: 22 23	And then how I got – I got a divorce. I was married and got a job in Owosso at Redmond's.	
24Shirley Bradley: 25	In a restaurant.	
26Edna Ramont: 27	No.	
28Shirley Bradley: 29	No.	
30Edna Ramont: 31	In a factory.	
32Shirley Bradley: 33	In a factory.	
34Edna Ramont: 35 36 37 38 39	And I made \$16.40 a week and you took, paid \$20 a month rent and \$4 for a babysitter, which don't leave much. And then I got a, put my application over here at the REO in December or somewheres in there, and I got the call to come. Well, that was just before Christmas. You don't know how good that was for me.	
40Shirley Bradley: 41	Oh, like a miracle.	
42Edna Ramont: 43 44	It was. And we had Christmas, a nice Christmas. I didn't go out. I started out making maybe \$40 a week. That's a big difference, you know.	
45Shirley Bradley: 46	Oh my gosh.	
47Edna Ramont:	Yes.	

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2Shirley Bradley: 3	[1:37] Do you remember what year you hired in?
4Edna Ramont: 5	In '42.
6Shirley Bradley: 7	In '42.
9 8Edna Ramont: 9	In December.
10Shirley Bradley: 11	During the war.
12Edna Ramont: 13	Uh-huh.
14Shirley Bradley: 15	Mm-hm.
16Edna Ramont: 17	Yeah. And I could tell you my, uh, badge number 323442.
18Shirley Bradley: 19	Great!
20Edna Ramont: 21	Ain't that something.
22Shirley Bradley: 23	Yes, it is.
24Edna Ramont: 25	Yeah. I gave that to Bobby.
26Shirley Bradley: 27 28	[1:54] Now what did they, where did they put you when you first started? What did you do?
29Edna Ramont: 30	Well, we went into the Navy Department and I worked on strikers.
31Shirley Bradley: 32	[2:02] Now what's that?
33Edna Ramont: 34 35 36	A round brass striker where we drilled holes in it but there was so much oil. When you got done working you was oil-soaked from head to toe [inaudible 2:14]. It was terrible.
37Shirley Bradley: 38	[2:15] Did you have to wear any special clothing or anything?
39Edna Ramont: 40	No. Well, we had
41Shirley Bradley: 42	or gloves?
43Edna Ramont: 44	I had overalls.
45Shirley Bradley: 46	Overalls.

1Edna Ramont: 2	Bib overalls we used to call it.
3Shirley Bradley: 4	Bib overalls. Okay.
5Edna Ramont: 6 7 8	And then on top of that we, we're doing the same amount of production as the men but we didn't get the money the men did and Ray Reed got us the same amount of pay.
9Shirley Bradley: 10	He did?
11Edna Ramont: 12 13	Yeah. And, uh, at the time, we'd get 5 minutes' break in the morning and 5 minutes in the afternoon. That's all you got.
14Shirley Bradley: 15	Five minutes. You couldn't really go away from your
16 16Edna Ramont: 17	No. Uh-huh, yeah.
18Shirley Bradley: 19	Just long, long enough to get to the bathroom maybe.
20Edna Ramont: 21 22 23 24 25	Yeah. That's it. Just the bathroom. A lot of them smoked, you know, so that would be it. And then I got transferred from there in the Navy yet and I was, uh, a relief operator when they took off to go to the restroom or grabbed a cigarette or then they would, I'd take their job. I got 5% more. [chuckle]
26Shirley Bradley: 27	Oh. Great.
28Edna Ramont: 29	Yes.
30Shirley Bradley: 31	So you could do the different jobs so you could, you could rotate.
32Edna Ramont: 33 34	Yeah. I can run any of the machines. Yeah. And I just took over when they went to the restroom.
35Shirley Bradley: 36 37	Hm. [3:27] Mr. Reed that you mentioned, was he the foreman in that Navy Department?
38Edna Ramont: 39	Ray, Ray Reed was the president of the union.
40Shirley Bradley: 41	President of the union. Oh.
42Edna Ramont: 43	Oh, he was a wonderful man.
44Shirley Bradley: 45	Oh, okay.
46Edna Ramont:	Very, very

3 4Edna Ramont: 5	for the people, he was for us.
6Shirley Bradley: 7	Oh, great. Somebody went to him and said look Ray
8Edna Ramont: 9	Yeah.
10Shirley Bradley: 11	we're not getting equal pay.
12Edna Ramont: 13	Yeah.
14Shirley Bradley: 15	We're working as hard.
16Edna Ramont: 17 18	Plus them days they didn't do it, you know. Women didn't get the money as the men did.
19 19Shirley Bradley: 20	I know it. Yeah.
21Edna Ramont: 22	So that made it nice that Ray did fight for us.
23Shirley Bradley: 24	[3:53] And you had how many children at that time?
25Edna Ramont: 26	Two.
27Shirley Bradley: 28	You had 2 to support.
29Edna Ramont: 30	And raise. Yeah. I was single.
31Shirley Bradley: 32	So you had to come to Lansing.
33Edna Ramont: 34	Yeah.
35Shirley Bradley: 36	Get a place to live and
37Edna Ramont: 38 39	And then after I got here, well, I, I started a rooming house on Christiancy Street.
40Shirley Bradley: 41	On Christiancy.
42Edna Ramont: 43 44 45	Across from the, where they had, uh, they were making poles for the plane, you know, over there at the, on Christiancy Street they had that factory. And I charged \$10 a week. That was for their board and room. And then during the weekends a lot of their wives would come down.

1 2 3	They were from Grand Rapids and way up north and all over. And they were nice guys. Everyone treated me wonderful.
4Shirley Bradley: 5	Good.
6Edna Ramont: 7 8	And I had my mother, she lived with me and my cousin. But I remembers I bought a half a hog. I'm not a butcher but I butchered that hog.
9Shirley Bradley: 10	Really? [chuckle]
11Edna Ramont: 12 13	Oh, that was a mess. Then they'd bring me rabbits and I'd clean them, you know, and we'd have that. You know, meat was hard to get.
14Shirley Bradley: 15	Well, yes. It was rationed.
16Edna Ramont: 17 18	You had to have a card to get it, see, but a lot of the guys would give us their cards, see.
19Shirley Bradley: 20	[5:00] Now that half a hog, did you have to have ration stamps to get that?
21Edna Ramont: 22	No. I didn't. I bought it from a farmer.
23Shirley Bradley: 24	Oh, and he didn't require you to give him.
25Edna Ramont: 26	No, uh-uh.
27Shirley Bradley: 28	He just needed the money.
29Edna Ramont: 30	Yeah.
31Shirley Bradley: 32	Ah!
33Edna Ramont: 34 35	But that was funny. You should have seen me butchering that hog. I'll never do that again. [laughter] You do a lot when you have to, you know.
36Shirley Bradley: 37	Oh, I've always said that.
38Edna Ramont: 39	Yeah. You do. But these guys
40Shirley Bradley: 41	Amazing stuff.
42Edna Ramont: 43 44	were just wonderful guys. They were, I don't know, they kind of kept an eye on my mother and I, you know.
45Shirley Bradley: 46	Oh, wasn't that nice.

1Edna Ramont: 2	Yeah.
2 3Shirley Bradley: 4	So it was good for everybody.
5Edna Ramont: 6	Yeah.
7Shirley Bradley: 8	And they had a place to live.
9Edna Ramont: 10	It helped [<mark>inaudible</mark> 5:29], you know.
11Shirley Bradley: 12	They could walk to work.
13Edna Ramont: 14 15 16 17	But this one guy, his name was Dick Lowe, he says "Well, I'm going to stop and, uh, but I'm only going to stay about a week or two." He says "I don't think I'll be here any longer." You know, his two brothers and dad moved in until I got married.
17 18Shirley Bradley: 19	Wow. [laughter]
20Edna Ramont: 21	Then they had to move. [chuckle]
22Shirley Bradley: 23	That would be L-o-w, Low?
24Edna Ramont: 25	L-o-w-e, yeah.
26Shirley Bradley: 27	Okay, e-e.
28Edna Ramont: 29	L-o-w-e, Dick his name was.
30Shirley Bradley: 31	Yeah.
32Edna Ramont: 33	But that was something else.
34Shirley Bradley: 35	I got it now.
36Edna Ramont: 37	He stopped just to stay a couple weeks, you know.
38Shirley Bradley: 39	Yeah.
40Edna Ramont: 41	Then I had the whole family. [chuckle]
42Shirley Bradley: 43	That's wonderful.
44Edna Ramont: 45	Oh, they were wonderful people.

1Shirley Bradley: 2 3	[6:08] Um, so, uh, so you stayed in the Navy Department during the whole, the whole war?
4Edna Ramont: 5	Yeah, mm-hm. Until we got laid off.
5 6Shirley Bradley: 7	[6:15] And that would have been after the war?
, 8Edna Ramont: 9	Yeah.
10Shirley Bradley: 11	[6:17] Like '46 maybe?
12Edna Ramont: 13	Uh-huh, yeah. And then we had our soup kitchen, you know, during the war.
14 15Shirley Bradley: 16	No. [6:21] Tell me about that.
17Edna Ramont: 18 19	I mean when we got laid off, you know, well, we had that down on Isbell Street down there I think it was where the tavern was at one time.
20Shirley Bradley: 21	Okay.
22Edna Ramont: 23	The tavern is there now.
24Shirley Bradley: 25	Okay.
26Edna Ramont: 27 28	But, uh, the farmers would bring in their food, you know. Whatever they could bring in, we'd cook.
29Shirley Bradley: 30	Surplus.
31Edna Ramont: 32	Yeah. And, well, they just did it anyway to help us.
33Shirley Bradley: 34	Oh.
35Edna Ramont: 36 37 38	'Cause a lot of people they, like Louie's family, they even came. Louie and Fifi and their little kids, you know. And a lot of them brought their family 'cause they didn't have no money to buy, no money comin' in.
39Shirley Bradley: 40	So the food came from the farmers.
41Edna Ramont: 42	Yeah.
43Shirley Bradley: 44	And they brought it in and gave it to you.
45Edna Ramont: 46	And then we cook.

1Shirley Bradley: 2	And you, and you gals all cooked it up.
2 3Edna Ramont: 4	Yeah, mm-hm.
5Shirley Bradley: 6	There was a kitchen there.
7Edna Ramont: 8	Yeah. A soup kitchen we'd call it.
9Shirley Bradley: 10	A soup kitchen.
11Edna Ramont: 12	It was something.
13Shirley Bradley: 14	I didn't know about that.
15Edna Ramont: 16	You didn't?
17Shirley Bradley: 18	No
19Edna Ramont: 20	Did you know we walked out too?
21Shirley Bradley: 22	No. [7:10] Tell me. Why?
23Edna Ramont: 24 25 Shisley Brodley	'Cause we didn't, they didn't want to give us a raise, the REO didn't. This was before the strike.
25Shirley Bradley: 26 27Edna Ramont:	This is, this is, uh, during the war.
28 29Shirley Bradley:	During the war.
30 31Edna Ramont:	Did you know that?
32 33Shirley Bradley:	Uh-uh.
34 35Edna Ramont:	Didn't you hear?
36 37Shirley Bradley:	Uh-uh.
38 39Edna Ramont:	There was a big article in the paper at the time. There was only one girl. I
40 41 42	seen her a while, quite a long while back. I can't think of her name but she was the nicest gal you can work with, but her husband was in service and she was the only one that didn't go out.
43 44Shirley Bradley:	Hm.
45 46Edna Ramont:	'Cause we all went out and we got our raise.

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2Shirley Bradley:	Oh.
3	
4Edna Ramont:	Not much but we got a little bit. And I'll never forget that. We wasn't out
5	very long.
6	
7Shirley Bradley:	[7:51] So what did you do? Did you just, just didn't, you got together and
8	agreed that you'd have a walkout?
9 10Edna Ramont:	Verh
10Euna Ramont: 11	Yeah.
12Shirley Bradley:	And you walked out during the working day or the
13	And you warked out during the working day of the
14Edna Ramont:	Yeah.
15	
16Shirley Bradley:	You were on double shifts then or something.
17	
18Edna Ramont:	Three shifts we had.
19	
20Shirley Bradley:	Three shifts.
21	
22Edna Ramont:	I hated that.
23 24Shirley Drodleyy	Did you?
24Shirley Bradley: 25	Did you?
26Edna Ramont:	The night shift.
20Lana Ramont. 27	
28Shirley Bradley:	[8:05] What shift were you on when the walkout happened?
29	
30Edna Ramont:	That was on days.
31	
32Shirley Bradley:	On days.
33	
34Edna Ramont:	Mm-hm.
35	
36Shirley Bradley:	Mm-hm. And everybody agreed.
37 38Edna Ramont:	Uh-huh. We all walked out.
39	On-hun. We all warked out.
40Shirley Bradley:	And you just shut your machines off and everybody
41	
42Edna Ramont:	Yeah.
43	
44Shirley Bradley:	[8:13] walked and went home?
45	
46Edna Ramont:	A lot of people don't remember that we walked out.

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2Shirley Bradley: 3	And, and you just, uh, [8:18] did you all just go home or did you?
4Edna Ramont: 5	We wa-, we walked, stood around, and then we walked the picket line.
6Shirley Bradley:	[8:24] How long? Oh, when you had picket.
7 8Edna Ramont:	It wasn't very long. It was only like
9 10Shirley Bradley:	It wasn't very long. Like a day or 2 or a week?
11 12Edna Ramont:	I think it was about a week anyway.
13 14Shirley Bradley:	Oh.
15 16Edna Ramont:	Yeah. But a lot of people didn't know that.
17 18Shirley Bradley: 19	I must have heard it back when I – my mother worked there when I was a kid but I don't remember that. Well, she didn't work in the Navy
20	Department so maybe that's why I didn't.
21 22Edna Ramont:	That was during the war, though.
23	
24Shirley Bradley: 25	Yeah. She was in the, out on the receiving docks at that time.
26Edna Ramont: 27	Well, she wouldn't be in.
28Shirley Bradley: 29	She wouldn't have heard about it.
30Edna Ramont: 31	Uh-uh. No. She wouldn't have been in on it.
32Shirley Bradley: 33	No.
34Edna Ramont: 35	Yeah.
36Shirley Bradley: 37 38	Um, so when you – so they finally came and met with you and said okay, okay.
39Edna Ramont: 40	Yeah. They gave us
40 41Shirley Bradley: 42	You can have your raise.
43Edna Ramont: 44	Yeah. They gave us a raise. It wasn't very much.
44 45Shirley Bradley: 46	Was that when Mr. Reed stepped in to help get you a raise or was that?

2 3Shirley Bradley: 4	That was separate.
5Edna Ramont: 6	That was afterwards.
7Shirley Bradley: 8	That was separate.
9Edna Ramont: 10	Afterwards.
11Shirley Bradley: 12	Okay.
13Edna Ramont: 14 15	Yeah. And then after we got laid off from the Navy, then we started with the Lawnmower.
15 16Shirley Bradley: 17	After the war was over.
18Edna Ramont: 19	Yeah.
20Shirley Bradley: 21	Now you're in the Lawnmower Department.
22Edna Ramont: 23	Yeah. I was in the Lawnmower [<mark>inaudible</mark> 9:17].
24Shirley Bradley: 25 26	I know that there were a lot of strikes and things in '46, a steel strike and a coal strike and
27Edna Ramont: 28	Yeah. Awful lot [<mark>inaudible</mark> 9:23].
29Shirley Bradley: 30 31	something else and my mother was out of work for almost a year I think.
32Edna Ramont: 33	Oh my God.
34Shirley Bradley: 35	She worked in a restaurant down what is now the LCC Campus.
36Edna Ramont: 37	Oh, is that right?
38Shirley Bradley: 39 40	It was a little restaurant down there near the [<mark>inaudible</mark> 9:35] Sandwich Shop…
41Edna Ramont: 42	Uh-huh.
43Shirley Bradley: 44 45 46	around the corner from it. And, uh, I guess the thing was then, if they caught you working somewhere else then you couldn't go back. They wouldn't hire you back but so it was always an open secret.

1Edna Ramont: 2	Yeah.
2 3Shirley Bradley: 4	Don't tell anybody I'm working here.
5Edna Ramont: 6	You didn't. Yeah. No, you didn't tell anybody.
7Shirley Bradley: 8	No. There wasn't unemployment.
9Edna Ramont: 10 11 12 13 14	In fact, I worked at the 701 Club. I got – how much was it? \$15 a week I think. No, I got maybe more, a little more than that but I made good in tips because the boys were coming home and, uh, then, uh, but otherwise my unemployment was only I think \$20 a week and that wasn't very much to live on.
15Shirley Bradley: 16	Uh-uh.
17Edna Ramont: 18 19	So I did go out to 701. I was, I was, oh, not the bartender but I was the server girl.
20Shirley Bradley: 21	Served the drinks.
22Edna Ramont: 23	Yeah.
24Shirley Bradley: 25	[10:27] 701 Club, where's, where was that?
26Edna Ramont: 27	That was a Veterans Club out on Grand River.
28Shirley Bradley: 29	Oh, east.
30Edna Ramont: 31	East Grand River.
32Shirley Bradley: 33	East Grand River.
34Edna Ramont: 35	It was in a home.
36Shirley Bradley: 37	Toward East Lansing.
38Edna Ramont: 39	Yeah.
40Shirley Bradley: 41	Oh, okay.
42Edna Ramont: 43	I worked there quite a while.
44Shirley Bradley: 45	[10:36] And how long were you there before you went back to the shop?
46Edna Ramont:	Well, not very long 'cause I got back in the Lawnmower.

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2Shirley Bradley: 3	Into the Lawnmower.
4Edna Ramont: 5	Thank God.
6Shirley Bradley: 7	[10:45] And what did you do in the Lawnmower Department?
9 8Edna Ramont: 9	Machines again.
10Shirley Bradley: 11	[10:49] What did, were you, uh?
11 12Edna Ramont: 13	I worked in parts, making parts.
14Shirley Bradley: 15	Making the parts for the lawnmowers.
16Edna Ramont: 17	Mm-hm.
18Shirley Bradley: 19 20	And you worked by then they only, [10:57] had they gone down to 1 shift or where they still double shift?
21Edna Ramont: 22	We had, uh, just if I remember right, it was just 1 shift.
23Shirley Bradley: 24	Yeah.
25Edna Ramont: 26	Uh-huh.
27Shirley Bradley: 28	Do you?
29Edna Ramont: 30 31	But you know when you worked on the machines, some of these people didn't work very fast, you could really make the money.
32Shirley Bradley: 33	You were
34Edna Ramont: 35	In fact, I think I was the first woman to earn \$15 in a day.
36Shirley Bradley: 37	Oh.
38Edna Ramont: 39	If you work [<mark>inaudible</mark> 11:19].
40Shirley Bradley: 41	[11:19] Now was that for production?
42Edna Ramont: 43	Yeah.
44Shirley Bradley: 45 46	You, the more production you turned out the more you could make, so it was like

1Edna Ramont: 2	Well, you couldn't turn in more than \$15.
2 3Shirley Bradley: 4	Oh.
- 5Edna Ramont: 6	You wasn't supposed to turn that but I did.
7Shirley Bradley: 8	Oh.
9Edna Ramont: 10	I started then the rest of us went along but you get [<mark>inaudible</mark> 11:32] older people, it was something, we could really make the production.
11	
12Shirley Bradley: 13	Hm.
14Edna Ramont: 15	In fact, I don't want to, I'm not bragging but Carl, uh, what's the name?
16Shirley Bradley: 17	Loudenslager.
18Edna Ramont: 19	No.
20Shirley Bradley: 21	No.
22Edna Ramont: 23	Carl, he's the time [inaudible 11:52] guy.
24Shirley Bradley: 25	Oh.
26Edna Ramont: 27 28	I mean he timed you on these jobs and he made the remark he never liked to time me because I worked too fast.
29Shirley Bradley: 30	[laughter]
31Edna Ramont: 32	I did. I was a fast, really a fast operator.
33Shirley Bradley: 34	I bet. Must be.
35Edna Ramont: 36 37 38	Yeah. In fact, when I left, well, I'm getting ahead of my story but anyway, I was always paid top dollar, you know, as much as I could turn in.
39Shirley Bradley: 40	'Cause you worked hard.
41Edna Ramont: 42	Yeah. I had my production ahead. Isn't that's something?
43Shirley Bradley: 44	Yeah. It's amazing. You should feel good about that
45Edna Ramont: 46	Yeah.

2 3Edna Ramont: 4	But
4 5Shirley Bradley: 6	and being able to do that and support your family.
7Edna Ramont: 8 9	And then, you know, even when we got in the Press Room and at first I went down to Motor Plant after I left when the Lawnmower went down.
10Shirley Bradley: 11	Oh, okay, so you were in the Lawnmower and then
11 12Edna Ramont: 13	Went down to the Motor Plant [inaudible 12:43].
14Shirley Bradley: 15	You went to the Motor Plant from the Lawnmower.
16 16Edna Ramont: 17	Mm-hm.
18Shirley Bradley: 19	Oh, back, oh, okay.
20Edna Ramont: 21	I was
22Shirley Bradley: 23	Okay.
24Edna Ramont: 25	Instead of getting a layoff I got transferred down there.
26Shirley Bradley: 27 28	Oh, I understand, okay. [12:53] And who did – let's go back for just a minute into Lawnmower. Do you remember any of the people you worked with or the foreman or anybody like that?

31 32Shirley Bradley: 33	Mm-hm.
34Edna Ramont: 35	Oh, Roy Kilviton.

39Edna Ramont: 40 41	Oh yeah. I can remember them all in Lawnmower. Yeah, there was like, uh, Florence Connelly. She worked in the henhouse.

44Edna Ramont: 45	In the henhouse we'd call it.
46Shirley Bradley:	Henhouse? What's that?

22Edna Ramont: 23 24 25	But I never liked to go on the line, you know. When they started the line, you know, they started with a line these girls would, you know. And then when they borrowed me to go down there, I couldn't keep up with them. But let them get on the machine [inaudible 15:05].

29Edna Ramont: 30	Yeah.
31Shirley Bradley: 32	when they were on the production line
33Edna Ramont: 34	Yeah.
35Shirley Bradley: 36	where things were going by you and
37Edna Ramont: 38	Yeah. Well they started on there.
39Shirley Bradley: 40	Fast.
41Edna Ramont: 42	And of course, I started on the, on the machines.
43Shirley Bradley: 44	Mm-hm.
45Edna Ramont: 46	But, oh, there's so many of them there. And there was [Bessie Robinson 15:22] there and then there was, uh, Arkie worked there.

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2Shirley Bradley: 3	Who did?
4Edna Ramont: 5	Edna Welch.
6Shirley Bradley: 7	Edna Welch.
9 8Edna Ramont: 9	Yeah.
10Shirley Bradley: 11	Did you say Arkie?
12Edna Ramont: 13	They called her Arkie, yeah. And
14Shirley Bradley: 15	I wonder if that was, um
16Edna Ramont: 17	Don Welch's wife.
18Shirley Bradley: 19	Hm?
20Edna Ramont: 21	Her husband's name was Don, one of [<mark>inaudible</mark> 15:50].
22Shirley Bradley: 23 24	My stepmother worked in the Navy Department, bomb fuses. And she had a sister named Arkie. They were from Arkansas.
25Edna Ramont: 26	Yeah. They were
27Shirley Bradley: 28	And I'm trying to think what Arkie's real name was. I don't know.
29Edna Ramont: 30	Arkie's name was Edna.
31Shirley Bradley: 32	Okay. I, I guess.
33Edna Ramont: 34	[<mark>Inaudible</mark> 16:06] friend of mine.
35Shirley Bradley: 36	A different woman, I guess. I just thought the nickname
37Edna Ramont: 38	Well, her sisters worked there.
39Shirley Bradley: 40	Hm?
41Edna Ramont: 42	Her sisters worked there.
43Shirley Bradley: 44	Did they?
45Edna Ramont: 46	Yeah. You think I could think of their name right now?

1Shirley Bradley: 2 3	Well, anyway. Okay, let's see here now, I've got lost myself here in my own memory. Um, so you went from Lawnmower to the Motor Plant.
4Edna Ramont: 5	Yeah.
6Shirley Bradley: 7	[16:28] What did you do in the Motor Plant?
8Edna Ramont: 9	I worked on machines.
10Shirley Bradley: 11	[16:34] What were you producing or what were you working on?
12Edna Ramont: 13 14	Well, one of the things I had to make, uh, drills, you know, you put the thing in and you drill in, I mean you're, not drills but, uh, screws.
15Shirley Bradley: 16	Okay.
17Edna Ramont: 18	And boy that was rough on your hands.
19Shirley Bradley: 20	Was it? Cut your hands up?
21Edna Ramont: 22	Yeah.
23Shirley Bradley: 24	And you had to put
25Edna Ramont: 26	You can't wear gloves either.
27Shirley Bradley: 28	Oh. And you were making drills.
29Edna Ramont: 30	Screws, yeah. We made screws, not drills, but screws.
31Shirley Bradley: 32	You were making screws.
33Edna Ramont: 34	Yeah.
35Shirley Bradley: 36	Oh, so you're putting them, something metal in.
37Edna Ramont: 38	In a machine.
39Shirley Bradley: 40	And that's cutting up a screw.
41Edna Ramont: 42	And it spins them.
43Shirley Bradley: 44	Oh.

1Edna Ramont: 2 3 4	And then I worked on the machines and then they wanted me to learn how to set up the jobs. That was – I'm not a setup person, I'll tell you that. [chuckle]
5Shirley Bradley: 6	[17:18] What was, what do you have to do when you're a setup person?
6 7Edna Ramont: 8 9 10 11 12 13 14 15 16 17	Well, you put like running the lathes, I could do that 'cause I know how to go put the blade in, you know, and do that. But when you set up the, oh, the mill-, mill, millwright machines, well, you had these great, big cutters and you hold 2 of them and you get them together, you know. I wouldn't set that up. I, why what if I did something? I'd seen one guy get hurt and, uh, 2 of them. Anyway, I got, then I got off of that and then I run the line and there was about 5 machines, you know. I'd start but I'd go right down that line and be back when the other one was ready to go quick. I was running that one line but, uh, I liked it real well. I – what was that guy's name? His name was Walt, first name.
18Shirley Bradley: 19	Walt.
20Edna Ramont: 21 22	I can't think of his last name now. [<mark>Inaudible</mark> 18:16] but he was a big guy. He was a nice guy to work for too. I had – people were really good, nice. I never had to complain about them.
23 24Shirley Bradley: 25	That's great.
26Edna Ramont: 27	Never.
28Shirley Bradley: 29 30 31	Um, I'm, I'm just curious for a second on setup. [18:32] Does that mean that you would get the machines ready for the day and something and somebody comes in and?
32Edna Ramont: 33	No. I had to run them.
34Shirley Bradley: 35	You had to run them.
36Edna Ramont: 37 38	Yeah. [chuckle] And I'm not a setup. I never, I tried to sharpen the drills and I could never sharpen them, like I said so, or molds.
39Shirley Bradley: 40	Oh.
41Edna Ramont: 42	He worked on the big machines, the great, big machines.
43Shirley Bradley: 44	Hm.
45Edna Ramont: 46	And he'd sharpen them for me.

1Shirley Bradley: 2 3 4	[18:54] What were the working conditions like? Say when you started out, uh, in the Navy Department and, uh, and then on through the Lawnmower and into the Motor Plant, what, what?
- 5Edna Ramont: 6	In the Motor Plant we had a lot of compound we used.
7Shirley Bradley: 8	Compound?
9Edna Ramont: 10	Yeah. And it kept the machines, the drills from getting caught, you know. And, oh, that was a mess.
11 12Shirley Bradley: 13	[19:16] Was that a liquid or like?
14Edna Ramont: 15	Yeah. Like milk. It was like milk.
16 16Shirley Bradley: 17	Like milk.
18Edna Ramont: 19	Yeah.
20Shirley Bradley: 21	[19:19] Was it greasy or?
22Edna Ramont: 23	It was dirty.
24Shirley Bradley: 25	Oh.
26Edna Ramont: 27	A lot of times they didn't watch and somebody would spit in it.
28Shirley Bradley: 29	Huh!
30Edna Ramont: 31	I'm not kidding. I'm not lying.
32Shirley Bradley: 33	I believe you, my dear. You were there, you saw it.
34Edna Ramont: 35	I remember.
36Shirley Bradley: 37	Um, so the compound you put that on things so that they wouldn't get hot.
38Edna Ramont: 39 40	Yeah. [<mark>Inaudible</mark> 19:38], you know, and it was – I liked the job. I, no matter where I was, I liked it.
41Shirley Bradley: 42	So
43Edna Ramont: 44	And I liked the people.
45Shirley Bradley: 46	Good. So during the war, the women wore

1Edna Ramont: 2	Slacks.
2 3Shirley Bradley: 4	Slacks.
5Edna Ramont: 6 7	If you wore a dress, it wouldn't work. [chuckle] You had to wear something, blue jeans or
8Shirley Bradley: 9	Slacks and a blouse.
10Edna Ramont: 11 12	Yeah. I used to, I remember I got my, my black pants, they were like blue jeans but they were black. Do you remember them?
13Shirley Bradley: 14	Mm-hm.
15Edna Ramont: 16	And I got them from Gordon's.
17Shirley Bradley: 18	Oh.
19Edna Ramont: 20	A lot of us wore them.
21Shirley Bradley: 22	Oh yes. Yes, of course.
23Edna Ramont: 24	Yeah. Remember?
25Shirley Bradley: 26 27	Mm-hm, mm-hm. And a hat. [20:19] Did you have to wear that hat that had the?
28Edna Ramont: 29	They had a net.
30Shirley Bradley: 31	The net at the
32Edna Ramont: 33	Yeah, just a net.
34Shirley Bradley: 35	Oh.
36Edna Ramont: 37	A hairnet.
38Shirley Bradley: 39	My mother had that blue hat
40Edna Ramont: 41	No
42Shirley Bradley: 43	that had like a snood they'd call them.
44Edna Ramont: 45	Yeah.
46Shirley Bradley:	With that net thing.

2Edna Ramont: 3	We didn't have them there.
4Shirley Bradley: 5	Her hair went into it.
5 6Edna Ramont:	Uh-uh.
7 8Shirley Bradley: 9	You didn't have to wear that.
9 10Edna Ramont: 11	No. But you had to keep your space cleaned up.
12Shirley Bradley:	You did.
13 14Edna Ramont:	Otherwise, you can fall and slip.
15 16Shirley Bradley:	So you, so it was slippery around where you were working.
17 18Edna Ramont:	It was. Yeah. You had to watch it, you know.
19 20Shirley Bradley: 21	[20:43] How would you clean up that grease or whatever?
21 22Edna Ramont: 23 24	Well, you, when if anything was on the floor like the metal and stuff, you had to keep it clean.
25Shirley Bradley: 26	Sweep it up.
27Edna Ramont: 28 29	'Cause that one old man in the Press Room, he let scrap pile up beside him and he got up and he cut his wrist. He was a real old man.
30Shirley Bradley: 31	Oh.
32Edna Ramont: 33 34 35	I can remember, uh, Mr., excuse me, [Robertson 21:06]. I forgot what his first name was but he was 80-something years or 80 years old on one of those machines. You should have seen that man.
36Shirley Bradley: 37	He was good, huh?
38Edna Ramont: 39 40	Yeah. And then his son worked, uh, his grandson worked the reamer and then there was like the Southwells. You know them don't you?
41Shirley Bradley: 42	The who?
42 43Edna Ramont: 44	Southwell.
44 45Shirley Bradley: 46	Southwells?

1Edna Ramont: 2 3	Yeah. There was Dick and Ray and his, their dad worked there. I remember their dad even, isn't that something?
4Shirley Bradley: 5 6	It's won-, I think it's wonderful. That's I think one of the wonderful things about REO that it was family.
7Edna Ramont: 8 9	Yeah. It was. But afterwards, though, you couldn't get anybody in, your relatives, you know.
10Shirley Bradley: 11	[21:50] After what?
12Edna Ramont: 13 14	Um, after the war, you know. My son was, Bobby and Kenny, but Bobby they wasn't going to hire him. I says, well, he's not my son. I raised him. His mother died but I raised him.
15 16Shirley Bradley: 17	Hm.
18Edna Ramont: 19	They hired him because he wasn't my relative.
20Shirley Bradley: 21	He wasn't blood relative. [22:08] They made that rule after the war?
22Edna Ramont: 23	Uh-huh.
24Shirley Bradley: 25 26	[22:11] Was that because so many men were coming back and needed their jobs back do you think or what?
27Edna Ramont: 28	I don't know what it was or why.
29Shirley Bradley: 30	[<mark>Inaudible</mark> 22:15].
31Edna Ramont: 32	It was something that they wouldn't hire them.
33Shirley Bradley: 34	Hm.
35Edna Ramont: 36 37	Then my son got hired in there, Kenny, and then Bobby stayed until they pulled the rug.
38Shirley Bradley: 39	[22:28] Until he, until what?
40Edna Ramont: 41	Until they pulled the rug.
42Shirley Bradley: 43	Oh, until they went down in '75
44Edna Ramont: 45	Bankrupt.
46Shirley Bradley:	'76.

1	
2Edna Ramont: 3	Yeah.
4Shirley Bradley: 5 6	Yeah. Um, okay, so you didn't have any relatives working there until later.
7Edna Ramont: 8	Until later.
9Shirley Bradley: 10	Okay. Um, [22:45] did they train you when you first went to work there?
11Edna Ramont: 12	No. I knew punch presses and machines 'cause I worked at Owosso.
13Shirley Bradley: 14	Oh.
15Edna Ramont: 16	See, I worked on machines there.
17Shirley Bradley: 18	So you could transfer.
19Edna Ramont: 20	I knew what I was doing.
21Shirley Bradley: 22	Okay.
23Edna Ramont: 24 25	Yeah. And, uh, then I went up to Punch Press afterwards. I, I wanted to transfer. I liked the punch press.
26Shirley Bradley: 27	Hm.
28Edna Ramont: 29	Then I got up there after I left the Motor Plant.
30Shirley Bradley: 31 32	[23:10] Oh, this is, now you're out of the Motor Plant and you go to what department?
33Edna Ramont: 34	Punch Press.
35Shirley Bradley: 36	Punch, that was called the Punch Press Department.
37Edna Ramont: 38	Yeah.
39Shirley Bradley: 40	Okay. [23:19] What kind of product were you working on there?
41Edna Ramont: 42	Oh.
43Shirley Bradley: 44	Something to do with the trucks I guess.
45Edna Ramont: 46	Well, yeah, we run the, we – I can remember running running boards.

1Shirley Bradley: 2	Running boards.
2 3Edna Ramont: 4	They were heavy. [chuckle]
- 5Shirley Bradley: 6	Hm.
7Edna Ramont: 8	Then I
9Shirley Bradley: 10	They were?
11Edna Ramont: 12	Then I run, uh, I had oil sticks.
13Shirley Bradley: 14	Oil sticks.
15Edna Ramont: 16	Mm-hm. You need oil sticks for the oil.
17Shirley Bradley: 18	Oh, where they would test the oil.
19Edna Ramont: 20	Yeah, yeah, yeah.
21Shirley Bradley: 22	The dipstick.
23Edna Ramont: 24	Dipstick.
25Shirley Bradley: 26	Oh, okay.
27Edna Ramont: 28	We made them.
29Shirley Bradley: 30	Uh-huh.
31Edna Ramont: 32 33	And then I w-, worked on the fenders but they, I used to get so mad. I'm short, see. It's so hard when they had them hanging up high.
34Shirley Bradley: 35	Oh.
36Edna Ramont: 37	And
38Shirley Bradley: 39	[23:58] Did they have anything for you to stand up on or?
40Edna Ramont: 41	I had some boards to stand on, a little platform I used.
42Shirley Bradley: 43	I see.
44Edna Ramont: 45 46	And then one time I went out the Press Room and the Heavy Press Room [inaudible 24:09]. They had me out there sometimes. But this one great, big machine they had, I remember I had to put both my hands in to get the

1 2	parts in and I had the, the trucker was bringing me 2 big boxes and you know what they were like and they had them stacked together. Well, you
3	hit that button and that machine come down, I got my, I just got my arms
4 5	out. I was so, I must have looked like I was about ready to pass out. Anyway, they put guards over them after that so you pushed a button but
6	they couldn't [inaudible 24:46]. That was dangerous.
7 8Shirley Bradley:	They should have had them in the first place, shouldn't they?
9	
10Edna Ramont: 11	Well, they didn't think.
12Shirley Bradley: 13	They didn't think anybody
14Edna Ramont: 15	That could have happened to a man even because when the trucker was bringing 2 boxes over, hit that button, boy, that was bad.
16	
17Shirley Bradley: 18	This was a box of parts that you were going to be working on
19Edna Ramont: 20	Yeah, mm-hm, mm-hm.
21Shirley Bradley: 22	on the press with, okay.
23Edna Ramont: 24	But that, that really scared me. [chuckle]
25Shirley Bradley:	My dear, I guess so.
26 27Edna Ramont:	But, uh
28	
29Shirley Bradley: 30	I guess so.
31Edna Ramont: 32	Then, uh
33Shirley Bradley:	So that was a safety concern. Um it doesn't sound like, like now with
34 35	OSHA, everything is looked at carefully
36Edna Ramont: 37	Yeah.
38Shirley Bradley: 39	but it wasn't then.
40Edna Ramont: 41	It wasn't then, no.
42Shirley Bradley: 43	So safety wasn't [<mark>inaudible</mark> 25:21].
44Edna Ramont: 45	And we had those old belts, you know, to run the machines.
46Shirley Bradley:	Oh yeah?

1	
2Edna Ramont: 3	These wide belts, leather belts, you know.
4Shirley Bradley:	[25:27] Did they ever break?
5 6Edna Ramont: 7 8	And they put, had to put oil and stuff on them to make them go sometimes.
9Shirley Bradley:	So they wouldn't dry up and so
10 11Edna Ramont: 12	Yeah.
13Shirley Bradley: 14	[25:33] Did you, did they ever break or cause?
15Edna Ramont: 16	No. They never broke.
17Shirley Bradley: 18	They never did. They kept oiled. [chuckle]
19Edna Ramont: 20 21	[Inaudible 25:37]. You think back how they run now those machines, you know, they were old ones.
22Shirley Bradley: 23	Oh, I know they had old machinery inside the shop.
24Edna Ramont: 25 26	Yeah. But it was something. And the people there, it was, uh, oh, let's see, what was the girl's name? There was 2 or 3 women there besides me and they're gone too.
27 28Shirley Bradley: 29	In the Punch Press Room.
30Edna Ramont: 31	Yeah.
32Shirley Bradley: 33	Mm-hm.
34Edna Ramont: 35	Mm-hm. Hazel Moss was one of them.
36Shirley Bradley: 37	Hazel Moss?
38Edna Ramont: 39 40	Uh-huh. And Ruth, uh, [<mark>Shafer</mark> 26:10], she died. Hazel is gone. You look back, all those girls are gone.
41Shirley Bradley: 42	It doesn't seem real, does it?
43Edna Ramont: 44	It doesn't seem possible.
45Shirley Bradley: 46	That's what I mean. Aw.

1Edna Ramont: 2 3	And then when they are, a lot of them got something wrong with their minds.
3 4Shirley Bradley: 5	Yeah. Aw. [26:29] Um, so how long were you in the Punch Press Room?
6Edna Ramont: 7	Until I retired.
8Shirley Bradley: 9	Until you retired, so
10Edna Ramont: 11	And then I worked in the Canteen Store at noon and in the morning.
12Shirley Bradley: 13	Oh, you did?
14Edna Ramont: 15	Oh yes.
16Shirley Bradley: 17 18	[26:39] Well, tell me first of all how, so how many years do you think you would have been in Punch Press before you retired?
19Edna Ramont: 20	Oh, good lord, I must have been there 10 years anyway.
21Shirley Bradley: 22	Oh, okay.
23Edna Ramont: 24	[<mark>Inaudible</mark> 26:51] that was the last job I had.
25Shirley Bradley: 26	Was it? [26:54] And so you retired do you think what year?
27Edna Ramont: 28 29	Well, let's see, I was, uh, 88 now and I retired when I was 56, so that would be 36 years in the, what year would that be?
30Shirley Bradley: 31	Let's see, I don't know what year you hired in.
32Edna Ramont: 33	'42.
34Shirley Bradley: 35	Oh, '42. I do too know.
36Edna Ramont: 37	Yeah.
38Shirley Bradley: 39 40	You told me that. You hired in at '42 and you were gone in '56. That's 14 years, so you worked at the REO for 14 years.
41Edna Ramont: 42	32 years I think.
43Shirley Bradley: 44	32 years.
45Edna Ramont: 46	Oh yes.

1Shirley Bradley: 2	Where, where, what's wrong with my – oh, wait a minute, I'm sorry.
2 3Edna Ramont: 4	[chuckle] Don't do that.
5Shirley Bradley: 6	You left, I got the wrong figure. You hired in in '42.
7Edna Ramont: 8	Yes.
9Shirley Bradley: 10	And you were there 32 years.
11Edna Ramont: 12	Yes.
13Shirley Bradley: 14	Seventy
15Edna Ramont: 16	I retired.
17Shirley Bradley: 18	So you retired in '74.
19Edna Ramont: 20	Yeah. Just before they
21Shirley Bradley: 22	Just couple years before they went down.
23Edna Ramont: 24	Yeah, mm-hm.
25Shirley Bradley: 26	Okay.
27Edna Ramont: 28	Mm-hm.
29Shirley Bradley: 30	[27:53] And then after you retired what happened?
31Edna Ramont: 32 33	Oh, I, uh, helped, oh, probably 3 or 4, no, 3 people that I know, different ones, set, um, setting up on their antiques, help
34Shirley Bradley: 35	Hm.
36Edna Ramont: 37	working with the antiques. I like antiques.
38Shirley Bradley: 39	Do you?
40Edna Ramont: 41	I did. Well, I sold all mine except [inaudible 28:17] got here.
42Shirley Bradley: 43 44 45	Oh. Oh, that's gorgeous. Um, so, what was I going to ask you? Oh. [28:24] When you retired, did, did you get your benefits, retirement benefits?

1Edna Ramont: 2 3	Yeah. I got \$350 for a few, not too long because then it went down to \$189.
4Shirley Bradley: 5	For a few months anyway.
6Edna Ramont: 7	Well, yeah, some months.
8Shirley Bradley: 9	Two years maybe or a year.
10Edna Ramont: 11	About a year, little over a year probably.
12Shirley Bradley: 13	Yeah. I think they
14Edna Ramont: 15	Then I got \$189.
16Shirley Bradley: 17	Oh.
18Edna Ramont: 19 20	So that's – and now we – and then we got our insurance paid too, you know. And then we had an insurance policy too and they took that away from us. And a lot of these old people, I shouldn't say old. I'm old too.
21	But anyway, I say that's what I – they were older than I was and they gave
22 23 24	up their policy, insurance, their own 'cause they figured they had REO. Well, then they don't have nothing. I felt sorry for a lot of these people.
24 25Shirley Bradley: 26	When they went bankrupt.
27Edna Ramont: 28	Yeah.
29Shirley Bradley: 30	Nobody had anything.
31Edna Ramont: 32	They, they lost everything.
33Shirley Bradley: 34	Their investment or their pension fund.
35Edna Ramont: 36 37	Their pension and everything. Well, look at what you get, \$189. My, my Blue Cross is \$500 a month.
38Shirley Bradley: 39	Mm-hm.
40Edna Ramont: 41 42	My rent is \$500 [<mark>inaudible</mark> 29:31] so where does it go? You don't get that much from Social Security.
43Shirley Bradley: 44	I'll say not.
45Edna Ramont:	

1	
2Shirley Bradley: 3	But you can, you can get along.
4Edna Ramont: 5	Yeah. But pay and the Blue Cross will probably go up again.
5 6Shirley Bradley: 7	Oh, insurance is getting so scary.
7 8Edna Ramont: 9	But you got to have it. It
9 10Shirley Bradley: 11 12	I was with some friends this noon and they had to carry their own insurance and they're in their 80s and
13Edna Ramont: 14	That's bad, isn't it?
15Shirley Bradley: 16	it's \$500-and-some a month
17Edna Ramont: 18	Yeah.
19Shirley Bradley: 20	just to carry insurance.
21Edna Ramont: 22 23	Yeah. Mine was \$500 but when I was in the hospital for 3 ½ months and the doctors and doctors, I don't know how many doctors I had, I didn't have to pay a penny.
24 25Shirley Bradley: 26	[30:15] And you had what?
27Edna Ramont: 28	I never had to pay a penny.
29Shirley Bradley: 30	Your insurance took care of it?
31Edna Ramont: 32	Every penny.
33Shirley Bradley: 34	Oh, how wonderful.
35Edna Ramont: 36	And all the [<mark>inaudible</mark> 30:22] bills.
37Shirley Bradley: 38	You have a good policy.
39Edna Ramont: 40	X-rays and everything.
41Shirley Bradley: 42	Great. Oh yeah, and just through daily keep, board and room
43Edna Ramont: 44	Yeah.
45Shirley Bradley: 46	and then tests and medications.

1Edna Ramont: 2	Oh yeah. That's terrible.
2 3Shirley Bradley: 4	[30:33] Um, what would you say looking back about the safety at REO?
5Edna Ramont: 6 7 8	Well, I think a lot of it they could have did better on the safety. One man got caught in the grinder, one of the double grinders and that, he got hurt real bad.
9Shirley Bradley: 10	Hm.
11Edna Ramont: 12 13	And then I had seen this man down in the Motor Plant and, of course, he had sleeves on. You're not supposed to wear sleeves but he had a big drill press about like that.
14 15Shirley Bradley: 16	Oh.
17Edna Ramont: 18 19	A drill and he was on that machine and he got caught [<mark>inaudible</mark> 31:05]. You know, I seen it happen and you suppose I could even yell.
20Shirley Bradley: 21	You were probably frozen.
22Edna Ramont: 23 24 25 26 27	Well, I was. And my setup man, I forget what his name was. He was a sweet, old man but he was a grouchy, old guy and he called me out.
