The more aware the Association is with issues at the grass roots level, the more effective they can be to develop programs and solutions to help create solutions that allow members perform their duties at a higher level.

I want to thank those of you I met at Norwich GC for taking the time to introduce yourselves. I have family in Connecticut and look forward to my work with all of you. I had mentioned

the opportunity to communicate important information through Clippings, and here is some to take note of:

• First a reminder, and a very important one at that. March 15th marked the expansion of the Americans with Disabilities Act to include not only the facilities at golf clubs, but the golf course as well. GCSAA has a free archived webcast that does a good job of informing members of the new requirements. In this 90-minute webcast, Peggy Greenwell will help you understand what this means for your facility. Greenwell, training coordinator & accessibility specialist for the U.S. Access Board, shares her knowledge about the new accessible design standards established for golf courses that cover technical specifications for golf car passages, accessible routes, teeing grounds, putting greens and weather shelters. 



Press Release: May 10, 2012

The New England Regional Turfgrass Foundation recently held its 15th Annual Meeting on April 24, 2012 where a new Executive Board was elected. The NERTE, Inc. announces that Scott Cybulski, CGCS of Martindale Golf Course, Auburn, Me., is the new President for 2012-2013 Fiscal year. Scott has been serving on the board since 2005 representing the Maine GCSA. Scott replaces Christopher Cowan of Atlantic Golf & Turf, who has represented the VtGCSA on the board for the past 11 years, and will continue as the Immediate Past President. Michael W. Stachowicz, Dedham Country and Polo Club, Dedham, MA will be filling the Vice-Presidential seat, Steve Mann, CGCS of the Captain's Golf Course of Brewster, MA will continue to be Treasurer and John Clark, Rochester Country Club, Dover, NH will begin a 2-year term as Secretary. The full Board of Directors consists of two appointed delegates from each of the 7 chapters of GCSAA in New England, plus a delegate from New England Sports Turf Managers Association and Massachusetts Association of Lawn Care Professionals. Two advisory positions are filled by Mary Owen, University of Massachusetts and Dr. Noel Jackson, University of Rhode Island.

The NERTF produced its 15th Annual Conference and Trade Show on February 6-9, 2012 at the Rhode Island Convention Center in Providence, RI. More than 2000 people attended, as overall

attendance reported an increase over 4% over 2011 conference. Total attendance was near 2800. Ray Bourque, retired NHL Hall of Fame Defenseman and former Boston Bruin shared stories and experiences as the Keynote Speaker. More than 64 scheduled education hours and 13 trade show hours were available during the 4-day

Oucen, who has also held the CGCS designation for 25-plus years. "This program requires their demonstration of a higher set of competencies in golf course management through testing and practical application. Employers can feel confident they employ a career professional who has made a strong commitment to professional development."

To qualify for GCSAA's competency-based certification program, a candidate must have at least three years of experience as a golf course superintendent, be employed in that capacity and meet post-secondary educational requirements and/or continuing education points. The candidate's knowledge, skills and abilities are validated through the development of a portfolio consisting of their responses to skill statements, case-study scenarios and submission of work samples; an on-site inspection of their golf facility; and a rigorous six-hour examination covering competencies relating to agronomic, business, communication, environment and leadership domains.

Maintaining certified status requires renewal every five years after the initial date of certification. To fulfill certification renewal requirements, a candidate must participate in 150 hours of continuing education and professional development. Two-hundred thirtyeight GCSAA certified superintendents renewed their certification in 2011.

Honorees were recognized at the Celebrate Certification! reception at the GCSAA Education Conference in Las Vegas last month. The reception is presented in partnership with Syngenta.

First and foremost we made a strategic decision to be proactive and positive in our dealings in Hartford. The CSGA decided to hold the first annual GOLF DAY at the Capital, CAGCS was invited to attend. We actually set up inside the Legislative Office Building (LOB) with the various golf groups and met with the all those that wandered by. The highlight was the completely electric greens mower supplied by Mark Osborne of Steven Willand; every passerby was amazed by this "cutting" edge technology. Our goal for the day wasn't to ask for anything but to make people aware of golf and how important we are to the state. The day was a huge success due to everyone's involvement; we will need you next year.

Next we had to deal with a ban on phosphorous. We actually met with the bill's sponsors and asked for a complete exemption from any bans. We almost made it clean but there were several

things that were agreed to as a compromise, namely application timing and application proximity to water sources. This article is just to recap the most recent activities, for specifics please refer to SB440 Phosphorous reduction or send me a message and I can get the answer.

Finally, we also had to deal with enhanced pesticide regulations. The strategy employed was to be positive, professional and proactive and present our own legislation to repeal the most recent laws on pesticides. This kept the folks on the "other "side busy and unable to mount enough momentum to further restrict plant

protectant usage. We were mostly concerned with the repeal of the state wide preemption law; currently towns (or potentially neighborhoods) do not havetheability to restrict plant protectants, only the state can. We were able to preserve the state wide preemption, business as usual.

Please help me out. I need you all to thank your local officials and representatives. We have been reaching out to them and they have been responsive. Please follow up and thank them for their support, even if they weren't supportive. Also Mike Duggan and Erica Fearn have been the best representatives

of CTEC, without their commitment and professionalism, simply we would have failed. Please take a moment and recognize them. Our next big issue is a new Northeast Regional Fertilizer Initiative; this will include New England and New York and affect the what, when and where of our fertilizer usage. This new initiative is similar to the cooperation amongst interested parties to benefit the Chesapeake Bay. I only received a request this week from GCSAA to become a stakeholder so I do not have any more detail to share, but you know I will. Remember get involved, thank someone for their efforts and most importantly...vote.
