# INTRODUCTION

# SPEED LIMITS

Reasonable and proper, having regard to width, traffic and use of the highway.

Speeds in excess of the following shall be prima facie unlawful:

15 m. p. h. when approaching grade crossings, passing schools, approaching highway intersections, going around curves or traversing grades when view is obstructed; and in business districts where traffic is not controlled by traffic officers or signals.

20 m. p. h. in business districts where traffic is controlled and in residence districts.

45 m. p. h. under all other conditions.

All vehicles must come to full stop before designated railway crossings.

# LOADING LIMITS

22,000 lbs. gross, plus one trailer only.

Local authorities may restrict weight, for not to exceed 90 days, when condition of highways demand.

Vehicle Commissioner may issue written permits for operation of restricted vehicles.

# REGISTRATION (Weight tax)

Motor vehicles are taxes as personal property. Registration year is October 1st to September 30th; 50% off

# MOTOR FUEL TAXES.

Amount per gallon - 4¢. Disposition. 2¢ to State High-way Fund; 2¢ equally to counties only for maintenance of public highways and bridges. Disposition of Annual Registration and License Fees. After expense of collection is deducted, money to be used exclusively for building and maintaining public roads and bridges, divided as follows: 80% to state; 20% to incorporated city or town where owner of motor vehicle resides - or to county if owner resides outside of incorporated city or town.

Alabama uses the Standardized Signs and Markers as adopted by the American Association of State Highway Officials and pictured and described on page of this book.

For state road, Alabama uses a diamond shape sign with black on white, giving the number of the road and the words "Ala. Road".

### CONNECTICUT

### SPEED LIMITS

No maximum speed limitation.

Requires proper and careful operation having regard for the width, traffic on and use of the highways.

Provides penalties for operating at speeds which will either endanger the life of a person riding in a car or of a person not riding in a car.

Commissioner may refuse to register any vehicle not capable or maintaining a speed of 12 miles per hour.

Passenger carriers for hire must come to full stop at railroad crossings.

#### LOUISIANA

## SPEED LIMITS

Reasonable and proper, having regard to traffic, murface, and width of highway and other existing conditions.

Speeds in excess of the following shall be brime facie unlewful:

15 m.p.h. when approaching grade crossings, passing schools, approaching intersections, going around curves or traversing grades when view is obstructed; and through business districts of municipalities where traffic is not controlled by officers or signals.

20 m.p.h. throws business districts of municipalities where traffic is controlled by traffic officers or traffic control devices, and through residential districts.

45 m.p.h. under all other conditions.

Trucks must be equipped with governors to regulate speed to 25 miles per hour for trucks of 1 or less tons capacity; 20 miles per hour for trucks of 1 to 2 tons; 18 m.p.h. for trucks of 2 to 3 tons; 15 m.p.h. for trucks of 3 to 4 tons; 12 m.p.h. for trucks of 4 tons and over, when equipped with solid tires. When equipped with pneumatic tires 10 m.p.h. additional is allowed.

All vehicles must come to full stop before crossing designated railroad crossings and before entering or crossing "through highways".

LOADING LIMITS

Highways are divided into clauses A, B, C, and D and gross meight limitations fixed accordingly, as follows:

Reasonable and proper speed at all times. The prima facie speeds are as follows:

Along city streets 15 miles per hour

All vehicles, gross weight of which exceeds 4 tons limited to 15 miles per hour, if equipped with rubber tires, and to 4 miles per hour if equipped with metal tires. All vehicles of more than 4 tons gross weight may be prohibited, by proper regulation, from driving over a bridge at more than 6 miles per hour.

Highway officials or Commissioner of Public Works may grant permission to operate heavier or bigger units over the highways under their jurisdiction.

#### TENNESSEE

#### SPEED LIMITS

No maximum speed law except that all vehicles shall be driven so as not to endanger the life or property of another. When an action is brought to recover damages for injuries sustaining through a motor vehicles running in excess of 20 m.p.h. the injured party shall have a lien on the vehicle.

Municipalities may set maximum speed limits not less than 15 m.p.h.

Reasonable and proper, having regard to traffic, surface and width of highways and other existing conditions. Speeds greater than the following shall be prima facie unlawful:

Under all other conditions 45 m.n.h.

PART III

#### DESIGN OF MARKEES AND SIGNS

#### STANDARD DESIGNS

The System of Standardized Signs and Markers was adopted by the American Accociation of State Highway Officials at Detroit, November 1925, and is described herein. These signs are developed in a set of working drawings prepared by the Bureau of Public Roads and adopted by the Association of State Highway Officials.

This set of designs is based on definite principles calculated to produce uniformity of significance in the signs themselves, and make familiarity with them essy to acquire on the part of the most casual driver.

These principles are a set of shapes each having its own significance; a set of color combinations each having its own significance; a few obvious symbols; and uniformity of erection and application as described.

## COLOR

All signs of a precautionary character, including the circular railroad sign, the octagonal stop sign, the diamord slow signs, and the square caution signs have black decigns on a yellow background.

All direction, information and restriction signs are black on a white background, except that the Rest Station Sign is white on a green background.

Route Markers have black copy on white background. (A few of the States are exceptions to this.)

### Symbols

The symbols used on the various signs are those for railroad

grade crossings, both for single and multiple tracks, for left and right curves and turns; for reversed curves and turns; the arrow on the directional sign and the arrow which accompanies the route marker.

#### DESCRIPTION OF MARKERS AND SIGNS

#### MARKER SERIES

#### U.S. ROUTE MARKER

The Standard Route Marker, M-3, Plate 1, which is a shield bearing the name of the State, the number of the route and the letters "U.S." shall be used in marking the United States Highways only. The background color of the shield is white and the decian black.

#### CITY MARKERS

The color scheme is the same as for the Route Marker. City Markers, M-23, Plate I, are to be off the same outline as the Standard Marker, but with reduced dimensions and with the name of the State omitted. This more ker is for use when a smaller sign is desired in lieu of the Standard Marker in congested districts of cities or towns.

CAUTION, SLOW, AND WARNING SIGN SERIES

#### CEMPRIL

These three series comprise a general set of signs to cover a large variety of conditions which it is desirable to meet in the interest of safety. The color scheme for these signs is yellow background with a black design. The yellow shade is that recommended by the Sectional Committee on Color Code of the American Engineering Standards Committee, and liquid samples of the standard yellow have been placed in the hands of each State Highman Department. Some manufacturers have indicated their intention of producing the precified shade under the name of "Federal Yellow".

#### DIRECTION AND INFORMATION SIGN SERIES

#### GENERAL

This series of signs is intended to furnish the traveler with directional and general information, but involving nothing of a precautionary nature. The signs are generally rectangular in outline, and the color scheme is black on a while background.

#### CITY AND VILLAGE SIGNS

Signs D-11 and D-12, Plate XIX, are for use at entrances to cities, villages or other well defined and named settlements or communities.

#### RESTRICTION SIGN SERIES

These signs, Load Limit R-1, No Dumping R-2, No Parking R-3, and Sneed Limit R-4, as shown on Plate XXVII, are used to indicate certain restrictions required by law. Such signs are not intended for the direct convenience of the traveler, but to warm him of legal restrictions in order to make the highway safer and processe the road and its beauty.

#### SIGM POSTS


There are numerous adequate designs for posts for supporting the signs. Plate XXVIII shows several types. All nosts should have holes spaced on 6-inch centers except the posts for markers in which it will be more advantageous to have holes spaced on 2-inch centers. Each State should adopt the material and design dictated by local resources and probe experience as most satisfactory and economical.

In erecting the signs, galvenized metal or composition parts should be used so far as possible. In addition it will be well to paint all bolt heads and other exposed metal parts to further reduce rust.

# PLATE I U. S STANDARD ROUTE MARKER












PLATE IV POSITION OF SIGN SHOWING ANGLE WITH CENTER LINE OF ROAD











PART IV

#### CONCLUSION

A study of the speed limits of the various states shows us a wide variation. This difference in regulation comes perhaps as a result of the topography of the different sections of the country and also the density of the population in the different parts. It is the opinion of the author that there should be a universal speed regulation in each state, with special regulations in cities, municipalities, densely populated districts, and any area of special nature. These special regulations should be plainly visible, to the motorist, by way of signs along the highway.

A study of the load limits on the various types of road reveals numerous complicated classifications. This variation is perhaps due to the difference in design of the different types of highways, climatic conditions, topography, types of roadbed, and so forth, in different sections. It would seem that a wide variation of such limits is necessary and practical to meet every type and road condition.

The matter of registration of motor vehicles by weight tax if purely a matter of legislation which is up to each individual state, regardless of the influence of any natural phenomena such as climate, type of road, topography, and so forth. It should be handled as desired by each individual state.

The ratter of motor fuel tax is also a matter of legislation, and should be handled in the same manner as registration by weight tax.

The sign markings of roads are well standardized and all U.S. Highways are marked with the U.S. Standard Code of signs and markers.

The matter of marking State Highways seems to be well standardized also. Caution and warning signs must conform to the U.S. Standard Code and the number markers and direction signs are a matter of choice of each individual state. This makes a uniform system easily understood by motorists.

The number of miles of road by types varies greatly in each state due to the difference in volume of traffic in different sections, climatic conditions, topography of the country, accessibility to raw materials with which to build roads and funds available for such use.

The highway system of the United States today is one of pride to its people, and is the result of experience and much research. With the ever changing design of motor vehicles, new designs of highways follow to meet all conditions, but a sound design alone is not enough to insure safety and fairness to motorists. A uniform traffic regulation must be maintained as well. The most important property of design and regulation is "uniformity" or expressed in a broader sense, "consistency".

When this ideal of design of roads, and making of traffic regulations is attained the bulk of the responsibility for traffic safety can then be passed conscientiously to the maintenance engineer and to the traffic control authorities.
