At a recent meeting with Ontario's College Affairs and Manpower Training Division plans were completed for the "GREENKEEPER Apprentice Program". Applications may be submitted after June 1, 1976. Interested clubs should contact Mr. H.A. Constable, Manager Training Services, Industrial Training Branch, 10th Floor, Mowat Block, 900 Bay Street, Toronto 965-6151. Or any of the Branch Offices of the Industrial Training Branch, for a counsellor to visit them to explain the program and to complete apprenticeship applications.

The course of interest will be a "Turf Management Option" for the Horticultural Program. Steering committee members Paul Dermott and Bob Heron met with Mr. Ron Gash, Chairman, to finalize the curriculum.

The duration was set at 6000 hours, (3 periods of 2000 hours). The basic course for the current landscaper and nurseryman program would apply, special texts were listed, and every conceivable golf course operation was covered in the training program.

Dr. Mark Sears, from the University of Guelph, Entomology Department is working on some extensive tests at the Board of Trade, in Woodbridge, Ontario. He has set up an insect trap, the insects are attracted by a black fluorescent light. When, Dr. Sears locates the type he is looking for he checks the course by removing sod plugs, looking for eggs and then determines when grubs will be a problem. Gord indicated at that time, he would notify area clubs.
