



Greens-sub drainage

We, as Superintendents of older golf courses may spend considerable time living with, and nursing the problem of poorly drained greens.

St. George's Golf Club, Toronto, Canada is such a course. Built in 1929, a championship golf course hosting numerous major tournaments.

As Superintendent the past 19 years we have had no serious problems with winter injury or summer wilt on greens; we have never overseeded, although we top dress frequently and maintain an adequate Penncross nursery as a contingency should problems arise. I suppose in this atmosphere you condition yourself to believing the greens are better than they actually are.

The story now unfolds as a result of extremes and is as follows:

The past winter in the Toronto area was extremely severe. From December 1st, 1980 to February 15th, 1981 we experienced maximum mean temperatures of -5°C and very light snow cover. The month of February will be remembered for the 6" snowfall followed by rain on February 10th, a record precipitation causing flooding and slush throughout the golf course. Extreme cold weather followed on February 11th causing the heaviest build-up of ice on record. This was followed by 10 days of abnormally mild weather from February 16th - 25th when temperatures were above freezing night and day, daytime temperatures averaging 7.5°C.

Knowing fully well the effects of ice build-up and injury to Poa, our predominant grass, I was particularly anxious as receding ice cover was checked daily. By February 22nd ice cover had all gone, the temperature was 12°C, it was almost golf-like weather and I made a few random checks to

determine frost levels which were at 6" on the old greens and soft, which I expected. Four new greens which were built to U.S.G.A. specs 1965-6 (to lengthen the golf course for the 1968 Canadian Open) were completely free of frost and firm, which I didn't quite expect, so rapidly.

The Golf Director was called out to view these extremes on February 28th and checked frost levels on two greens which were at 6" level with puddled water on the surface. we then checked a new green built to U.S.G.A. specs, no frost and guite firm on the surface, he advised to continue testing on all greens. Upon analysis at this stage, we had convincing proof and evidence that the four greens rebuilt to U.S.G.A. specifications in 1965-6 were performing as well as ever re drainage. We also rebuilt the right half of No. 7 green to U.S.G.A. specs in 1968 (slope too severe).

We were well aware of the playing qualitites of the new greens, consistant and firm, especially in wet conditions, faster greening up qualities in the Spring. Those greens then were our *check greens* in which we compared all others.

There was one other thorn in the flesh -No. 1 green, which had been rebuilt in the Fall of 1972, this green has not improved in quality since, noted for hardness, shallow roots and a constant source of comment from members.

A diagnosis of the green before rebuilding revealed only 4" - 6" of top soil material and we decided all that was necessary to improve this green was to add soil, which we did, of good quality sandy loam to a depth of 7" in the centre tapering off at the edges to slightly crown the green and resod with Penncross.

It is now evident that if we had followed U.S.G.A. greens specs to the letter, this green, despite a

shade factor would have been better quality than it is.

On March 3rd I reported to the Golf Director my thoughts on rebuilding all problem drainage greens to improve the quality but also to be able to open earlier in the Spring as several of our neighbours were able to do.

At this stage, I also wrote to Al Radko, U.S.G.A. Greens Section Director; Dr. Bill Daniels, Turf Specialist, Purdue University; and Dr. Jack Eggens and Dr. Bob Sheard, Horticulture and Soil Sciences respectively, University of Guelph, Ontario, for their comments and grateful for their favourable advice, which is that complete rebuilding was the only long term solution.

In order to sell the idea of rebuilding greens to the members (a formidable task) it was obvious that intensive testing was necessary to cover all the angles and provide a sound base for presenting a case for the major task of rebuilding.

The necessary instruments - a common soil testing probe and soil thermometer and 2-3 hours of exercise walking around the golf course in cool Spring temps.

We started tests February 23rd and finished May 16th as follows, testing:

- 1. Frost levels
- 2. Soil temperature at 3"
- 3. Root growth
- 4. Top growth & quality

Frost Levels

Frost levels - on all greens very quickly revealed where our problems lay. The 5 U.S.G.A. specs greens were isolated immediately on account of good drainage. Of the remainder (despite inadequate, non-functioning drainage systems) seven greens warmed up fast on account of sunlit exposure and sheltered from cold

N.W. winds. The remaining seven greens were the main attraction and revealed inconsistancies that made it all the more remarkable that grass was able to grow at all.

Soil Temperatures

Soil temperatures - We decided on a constant depth of 3" and also checked air temperature at the same time. In the 2 hour period to complete this test on 19 greens there often would be a rise in temperature of 2° - 3° in the soils. We then checked highs and lows together for a true comparison.

Root Growth

Root growth - The disparity in quality continued through May on greens 1 and 16 in particular. Although root growth began to even out by the middle of May top growth was tardy and there was still evidence of winter injury showing on 1st and 16th greens into June.

In Conclusion

In conclusion - during the period February 23rd to May 16th we learned more about greens individual characteristics than the previous 18 years, the work load was light at that time and we were able to devote considerable attention to detail.

The experience gained has resulted in several changes in the greens maintenance programme this year:

- 1. The U.S.G.A. greens were not aerified due to good drainage characteristics and non-compacting top soil layer.
- 2. The original greens in good sunlit locations which warmed up well in the Spring were aerified, plugs removed and sand top dressing applied to fill the plug holes.
- 3. The other original greens slow to warm up etc. were aerified only. They should be rebuilt because of poor drainage on a clay sub-base.

Seminar

March 6-7, 1982 The Constellation Hotel Toronto, Ontario Plants, like people, need a well-balanced diet to survive and grow. Because of the stress inflicted by the game of golf, proper nutrition is particularly important to turfgrass plants and therefore to golf course superintendents.

GCSAA's two-day nutrition seminar was designed to provide a complete look at the turf plant's nutritional needs, from the mathematics of fertilizer application to symptoms of deficiency.

Seminar instructors **Dr. Paul Rieke** and **Dr. Robert Shearman** will stress essential elements, their effect on the plant's tissue and their availability in the soil. Fertilizer types and application methods also will be reviewed.
