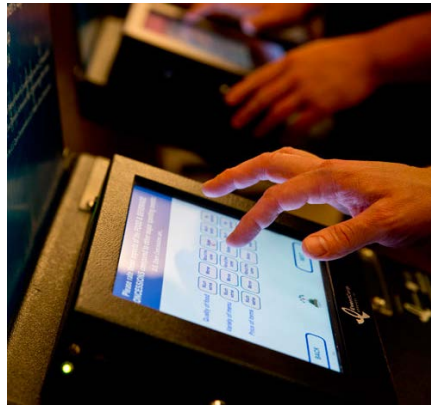

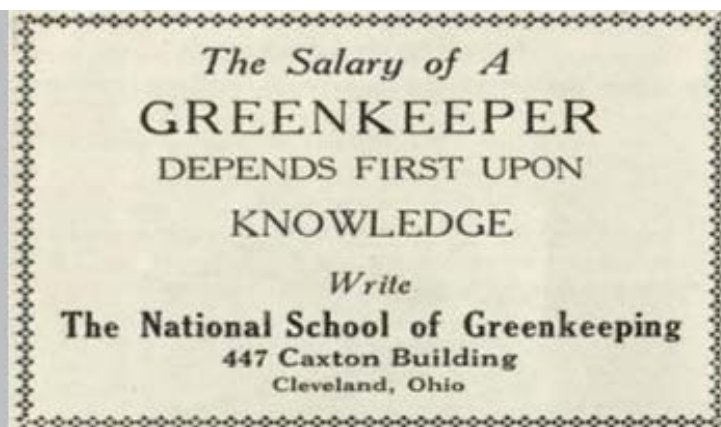

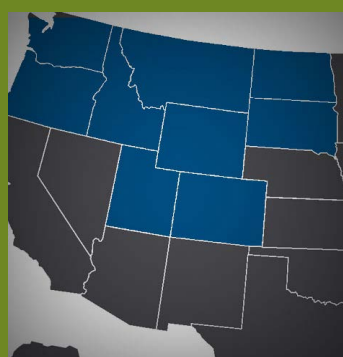
NORTH-CENTRAL REGION
