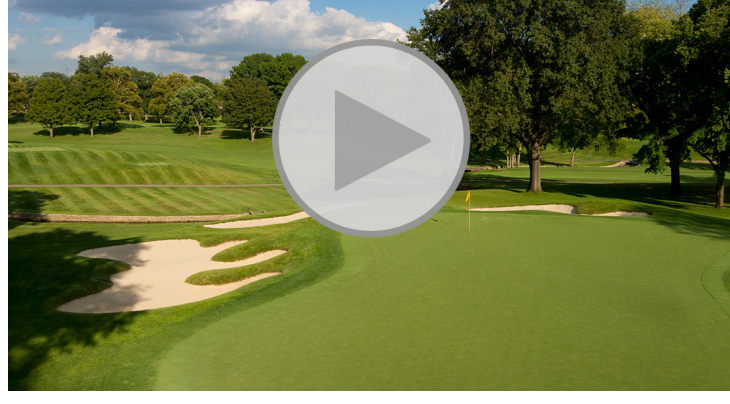

Jordan Booth Joins the Green Section Staff

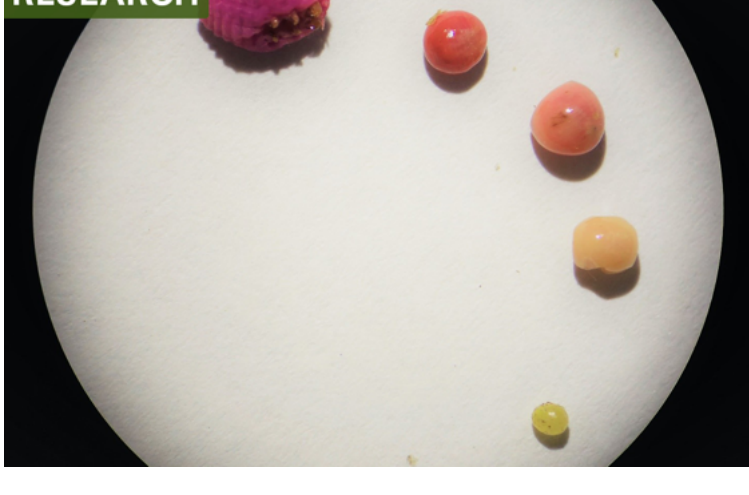

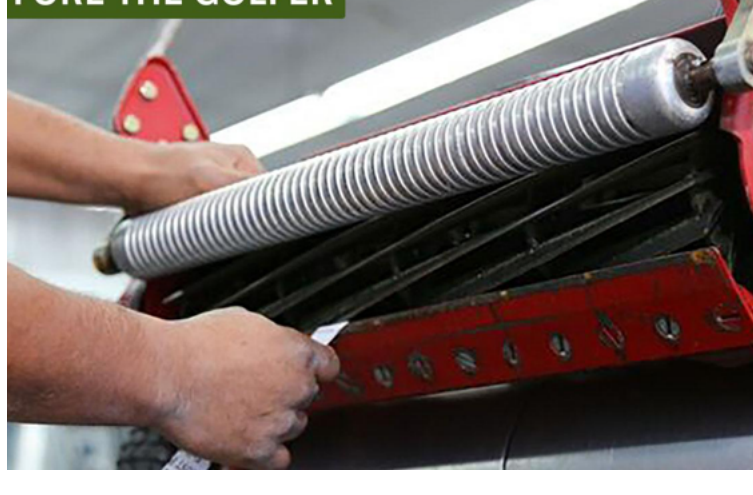
