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

There shall be a standing committee to assist the Council in the transaction of its business, to be appointed by the President, and whose number and dustes shall be as-follows:

A committee on claims and accounts, to consist of three members, whose duty it shall be to examine and report on all claims and accounts, are such as the standard of the country of the standard of the standa claims and accounts against the corporation, and all bills pr sented to the Council must be approved by said committe before being allowed. perfore needs allowed.

A committee on ways and means, to consist of three members, whose duty it shall be to examine and report on the state of the revenue, debts, and expenditures, and the necessity of the expenditures

A committee on health, to consist of three members, whose duty it shall be to examine and report on all matters relating. duty it shall be to examine and report on all matters relating-to the public health.

A committee on streets, to consist of three members, whose duty it shall be to examine and report on the condition and the necessity of the repairs of the streets and bridges of said village, and supervise the work of the Marshal upon the same,

And if any obstruction be placed as before mentioned, it shall be removed by the person so placing or constructing such obstruction, forthwith, after being notified so to do by the Marshal, whose duty it shall be to request the removal of thefsame. It the Marshal is unable to notify such persons personally, he shall serve such notice by posting a written notice in some conspicuous place on nuch premiers.

It shall be inwful for the President and Trustees of the village of Manchester to establish and maintain a Pound, at such place as they may designate, and regulate the same, for the purpose of impounding, keeping and restraining horses, cattle, sheep, swine, mules, and other animals, geese and other poulity, that may be found running at large in any of the streets, larce, alleys or parks, or-treepssateig on the lots, yards, or lands, of individuals within the village, and to impose such fees, fines and charges for impounding the same therein as they may deem proper.

Sec. 2. Any person forcing open, foreithly entering, injuring or destroying the building, structure, ahed, or fence, used for purpose of a Pound, as provided for in the foregoing section, or forcibly taking-possession of anile als impounded therein, shall be subject to a penalty, on conviction thereof belore a competent court, in a sum not least than five, nor more than twenty-like solviers, and shall be labelefor the cost, charges and expense of all repairs that may be necessity; and may, also, in the discretion of the court, for imprisoned until such fine be paid; but not for a longer time than three months.
