A committee on ordinance, to consist of three members, whose duty it shall be to submit drafts of, and recommend new ordinance, the members of the work of the Marshal upon the same.

As Scintion to the Public Peace.

Sec. 1. Any person who shall create and countenance, or assist in making any disturbance, unnecessary of unusual holse, or abati be guilty of any immoral or insulting conduct or language in the streets or eleawhere in the village of Manchester, and all persons who shall collect in bodies or crowds in ead village, for unlawful purposes, to the annoyance of the citizens or travelers of said village, shall for each offen e, on conviction before a competent court, be subject to a penalty not exceeding one hundred deliars, and not less than five dollars, on the first of the said village, in prisonment in the County shall, and may be held to bail for good behavior.

Sec. 2: Any person who may be found lurking or lying in wait in any building or premises within the limits of said village, with the intent to-do say mischief, or to commit any crime or misdementor whatever, shall, for every such offense, on conviction thereof, be subject to a penalty of not less than five, nor more than one hundred dollars, or imprisonment not more than three months in the County Sail.

SEC. 1. Any person or persons who shall, within the limits of the village of Manchester, keep a disorderly or ill-governed house or brothel, or gaming-house, or place of resort for persons of evil name or Tame, or who shall permit any reveling, rioting or disturbance, every peason or persons so oftending in the premises, shall, on conviction thereof before a competent court, be subject to a penalty of not less than five, now more than one hundred dollars, nor more than three months' imprisonment in the County Jail.

SEC. 2. It shall not be lawful for any person to sell, or give away, at any time, or permit to be sold or given away, at any time, or permit to be sold or given away, to any

Sec. 1. It shall not be lawful for any person of persons to keep, in or about his shop, dwelling, or premises occupied by himself within the village of Marchester, any offensive animal or vercitable matter, or carry on any offensive trade, or occupation that may be prejudicial to health therein, and any person violating any of the precisions of the two tests, while the property of the trade of the two tests.

SEC. L. It shall not be lawful for any hawker or peddler to expose for sale any article of cools, wares or merchandise, within the corporate limits of said village, without first having obtained a license therefor fram the Common Council, under a penalty of not exceeding fifty dollars for each offency; and such license shall, upon request, be exhibited to any resident of said village; and the committee on license is hereby authorized to grant licenses to hawkers or peddiers, upon anyment of not exceeding twenty-five dollars, and not less than two dollars per day, at their discretion, for each and every license to granted.

Sec. 2. No person shall exercise the business of an auctioner, without a license from the proper authorities of said village. This section shall not apply to the sale of property under legal process.

SEC. I It shall not be lawful for the owner of any dog to suffer the same to run at large within the corporate limits of the citiage of Manchester, from the lat day of June until the 15th day of September, unless the same shall be properly muzatat

SEC. 3. All licenses grarted in accardance with the previous section shall specify the articles to be sold, and for how long a period; on the party filling a bond in the penal sum of five hundred dollars, for the faithful observance of the charter and ordinances, of the village, and paying into the treasury not more than one hundred dollars for one year, and such sum for a shorter period as may be decemed proper; but not more than twenty-like dollars for any one day.

SEC. 4. Any person violating any of the provisions of this by-like shall be fiable to apenalty of not less than ten dollars, nor more than one bundred dollars for each offices; or, in default of payment, to not more than thirty days in the County dati. BY-LAW XIX.

The President and Trustees shall have full power and authority, at any meeting of the Council, to affor the removal from when the limits of the village, or to such place therein as they may designate, any gunprowder, naphfa, height, continue, the properties of the power of the root hereof tailing to remove the same for one hour after notice, said substance or maternal may be removed, by the Marshal, under the order of the Council, at the cost and expense of the owner or nonscassor of the same; and the village shall in no wise be liable for injury to, as loss of the passer, in the generally thereof.

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
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














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
