LEOPOLD, Prince of Lippe-Detmold, who died on the 8th inst., was born in 1821 and succeeded to the throne, on the death of his father, in 1851. The heir to the throne is Prince Gouthein Frederic Waldemar, brother of the decsased Leopold. The house of Lippe-Detmold is a younger branch of the family of Lippe, which dates its origin back to the eixteenth century. The Principality is situated in north-western Germany, and comprises only four hundred and thirtyeight square miles of territory. One of its chie claims to distinction is the Tantonburger-Wald, where Hermann, the first German leader, is supposed to have exterminated the legions of Venus.

Polar Explorations. Professor Nordenskiold has accomplished the most successful Polar expedition of the year. He started from Tromso on the 8th of June, passed through the Kara Sea, hitherto considered the ice cellar of the North Pole; reached the mouth of the Yenisel on the 15th of August; proceeded by boat up this stream as far as Yeniseisk, returning + Health. by the great Siberian route, via Tomsk Omsk, and Vekaterinburg, to Europe, having discovered a new ocean route between Europe and Siberia, of the importance of which we can gain some idea by glancing at the territory on a map of Asia drained by the Obi, the Irtisch, the

Yenisel, and their tributaries. A map kindly furnished to us by Dr Petermann, of Gotha, shows more clearly than any description the vast territory thus virtually opened up to commerce, and reveals the river system penetrating deep into the interior of Asia, the products of which, hitherto transported overland, can now be brought to European markets in a few days through the Obi and Yenisei.

This territory is larger than the whole

of Europe, excepting Russia. A regular steam navigation already exists on the more southern parts of the Obi. Irtisch Yenisei, and, as Dr. Petermann remarks, if Norenskiold's assumption comes to be realized, the valuable products of the immense lands of inner Asia and China is only equal to a twentieth part of that the exports conveyed to it are little more than building timber.

An Editor of 1775.

In 1775 there were four newspapers

published in New York. Rivington's Royal Gazetteer was the subservient tool of the British authorities. The Mercury, published by Hugh Gaine, was a timeserver and trimmer. Anderson's Constitutional Gazette was born and died in 1775, and had no influence whatever.
The New York Journal, published by John Holt, was the sturdy and unpurchasable organ of the Sons of Liberty. Its editor fled the city after the disastrous battle on Long Island, and he was heard of afterward as publishing his newspaper at one and another of the towns on the Hudson under circumstances that would have appalled a less determined man. In the month of August, 1777, while at Esopus, he printed an advertisement, in country produce in the way of trade. prospectus reads very quaintly: "And the printer, being unable to earry on his business without the necessaries of life, is obliged to affix. the following prices to his work, viz: For a quarter of news, 12 lbs. of beef, pork, veal, or muttou. or 4 lbs. of butter, or 7 lbs. of cheese, or 18 lbs. of fine flour, or a half bushel of wheat, or one bushel of Indian corn, or half a cord of wood, or 300 weight of hay, or other articles of country produce as he shall want them, in like proper-tions, or as much money as will purchase them at the time; for other articles of printing work, the prices to be in proportion to that of the newspaper. All nis customers, who have to spare any of the above, or other articles of country produce, he hopes will let him know it, and afford him the necessary supplies, without which his business here must very soon be discontinued." 


