FARM AND HOME.

SHADON FISHING.—One good farm-er who has purchased in the summer his mill feed for his stock, when it is cheaper than it is in winter.

GRASSLANDS.—In regard to English clover the claim is made by the owners of the land that the quality of the clover is not so good as that of the clover which is raised in the soil through the medium of cotton cake or a pasture containing all the best species of grasses and an abundant growth of white clover has been produced.

THE YIELD OF WHEAT.—To test the bearing quality of the leading varieties of wheat, the Superintendent of the Ohio Agricultural College Farm sold wheat to farmers in various parts of Ohio and other States, requesting a report of yield from each. The results are shown in the following comparison:

DUPLICATE THREE.—Cut up honey-comb into pieces from three to four inches wide and a half an inch or more in length, dredge them in flour, and lay out on a charcoal fire; squeeze a little lemon juice over each piece, and add a little salt. The duplicate three is a good variety of wheat, and is well adapted to the soil of the State.

DUPLICATE FOUR.—This is a good variety of wheat, and is well adapted to the soil of the State.
