

Thurlow Weed Barnes, of the Albany Evening Journal, says Gniteau, the man who shot I'resident Garfield, called upon him last October and asked for a chance to speak on the stump for the Republican National ticket. Guiteau said he had been employed by the Republican State Committee to do work at their rooms in New York, and that he was on his way there. Barnes questioned him closely at the time, and not liking his looks, told E. M. Johnson, Secretary of the State Committee, that he believed Guiteau to be a fraud. Johnson made a memorandum, and said he would look into the case. Barnes was Chairman of

Guiteau was placed in the Oneida Community, when a boy, by his father, and after several years there, he turned up. in Chicago a lawyer. He is a Second Adventist in religious principles, and has lectured upon that topic.

The package of documents left by Guiteau, intended for Byron Andrews, of the Chicago Inter-thean, were placed in the hands of the police, and were not delivered to that gentleman. 




