



FREMONT'S EXPEDITIONS.

Fremont's genius showed itself hiefly in his explorations, which were fully appreciated at the time by his fallow-countrymen, and were known by the scientific world of Europe. His mad different exploring expeditions experted a period of more than ten jears. Before the first of these experiors ditions general ignorance prevailed as between the eastern slopes of the Reckies and the western slopes of the Serra Nevadas. This he supplanted with accurate and extensive information as to nearly the entire region west the Missouri river and between

Mexican and British possessions.

The personal experiences of members The personal experiences of members of the exploring parties would make a verume of thrilling interest. In those days buffaloes swarmed on the Westers plains; hostile bands of Indians ware full of extremes. From a superalundance of buffalo meat on the hot prairies, it was often but a few days pearies, it was often but a few days before the party almost died of famine in the snow of the mountains. At different times some of them were killed by Indians, overcome by the cold, lost in storms, and forced to eat their horses and dogs. They descended rapids, and cut their way through snow banks until many of their ani-mals died of exhaustion and hunger. Fremont was an ideal leader. His

courage was a constant quality. His companions admired him for his genfeeling for all of his company; d they could not but be brave when led by one who had no fear. Among his companions was the famous scout. his companions was the famous scout.

Kit Carson, whose eccentric daring
and skilful hunting enlivened with
many surprising incidents the experiences of the expeditions which he accompanied.

The object of the first expedition was to obtain accurate knowledge as to the character of the territories of Nebraska and Wyoming, and especially of South Pass—the opening through the mountains on the way to Oregon. He accomplished even more than this; going farther north, he planted the United States flag on the highest peak of the Rockies, which now bears his name. His report at once made it evident that much of this Western country was so fertile that it would on he settled. The second expedition which started

in the spring of 1843, and lasted for fourteen months, was much more ambitions. Its object was to explore the possible lines of communication between Missouri, Nebraska, Wyoming. Utah, Idaho and Oregon, and to find a way by land from the lower Columhis river to the bay of San Francisco. The wonderful hardships endured up on this expedition were rewarded with the marvelous disclosures of the geographical variety and wealth of the consisted in encouraging his people to amuse themselves. He was a tall. large man, robed from head to foot in a loose black gown, and looking more like a minister of religion than a masquerader as she sat bolt-upright on a sort of triumphal car. WORKING HOURS ABROAD. The Length of the Laboring Day in Vaions European Countries.

A Turkish laboring day lasts from sunrise to sunset with certain intervals for refreshments and repose, says Chambers' Journal. In Montenegro the day laborer begins work between 5 and 6 in the morning, knocks off at 8 for half an hour, works on till noon, rests until 2, and then labors on until sunset. This is in summer. In winter he commences work at 7:30 or 8. rests from 12 to 1, and works uninterruptedly from that time to sunset. The rules respecting skilled labor are theoretically the same, but considerable laxity prevails in practice. In Servia the principle of individual convenience rules in every case. In Portugal from sunrise to sunset is the usual length of the working day. With field laborers and workmen in the building trade the summer working day begins at 4:30 or 5 in the morning and ends at 7 in the evening, two middle of the day. In winter the Fours are from 7:30 to 5 with a shorter interval of repose. In manufac-tories the rule is twelve hours in summer and ten in winter, with an hour

Eleven hours is the average day's labor in Belgium, but brewers men work from ten to seventeen hours; brickmakers, sixteen; the cabinet-makers of Brussels and Ghent are often at work seventeen hours, with an hour and a half off at noon; railway guards sometimes know what it is to work nineteen and a half hours at a stretch, and in the mining districts teen or fourteen hours.

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
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
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
