A Well-known Southron Suicides. Major Campbell Brown, a widely known stock raiser of Nashville, Tenn., known stock raiser of Nashville, Tenn., committed suicide at Grand Rapids by shooting himself through the head. For years he has been troubled with spells of despondency, and treatment in a private asylum failed to relieve him. Two months ago he went to Grand Rapids to join a class of Christain Scientists conducted by Mr. King, his friends hoping thereby to give a new direction to his thoughts. His body was found in a field north of the city at night by workmen. Brown was 53 years old, and has a wife and children living on a farm near Nashville.

HOME RULE FOR IRELAND.

Gladstone's Greatest Achievement Passes the House of Commons.

London cable: Mr. Gladstone's long home rule fight in the house of com-mons is ended. The bill was passed at l o'clock in the morning by 301 to 207. It was harried to the house of lords; which gave it the first reading and ad-

which gave it the first reading and adjourned.

Mr. Gladstone's journey from his residence to the house of commons was a triumphal journey, the streets being crowded with cheering multitudes. The galleries of the house were crowded also, and the members were early in their seats. The debate was continued by Justin McCarthy, and John Morley, chief secretary of Ireland, spoke for the bill, while Mr. Chamberlain and Mr. Balfour, each in lengthy brilliant speeches, opposed the measure. A division was had upon Mr. Courtney's amendment to reject the bill and the amendment was defeated. The bill was then put on its third reading and was passed by a vote of 301 to 267.

The full import of the occasion was felt by the spectators and by the government adherents and the culminaernment adherents and the culmination of the work in the house was accompanied by rounds of frantic cheers
from the galleries and upon the floor.

Repeal Measure Sure to Pass. A careful poll of the probable vote in the senate on the repeal bill has been made. The twenty-seventh annual encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic at Indianapolis was certainly a magnificent success in every particular. The weather was simply superb, the city was a bower of decorations and the hospitality of the people was all that anyone could ask. The boys arrived slowly, but on the day of the parado there were at least 50,000 visitors in the city and more than 25,000 veterans in the procession.

Illinois held the position of honor at the head of the veterans with 2,000

the head of the veterans with 2,000 men. The famous old war eagle "Old Abe," which was carried alive throughout the war on Wisconsin's banner, was at the head of that state's heroes. Ohio at the head of that state's neroes. Only had over 2,500 men on parade. Penn-sylvania and New York were well rep-resented and Massachusetts, with Capt. "Jack". Adams—prominent candidate for national commander-in-chief—in for national commander-in-chief—in line. Michigan's boys did the Wolverine state proud with nearly 1,000 men in line; a feature being the splendidly drilled and dressed Detroit post with the 19th U.S. infantry band. When Hoosierdom's long line of soldiers came along there was tremendous cheering as ex-President Harrison marched along with the rank and file of his comrades. All the states and territories were represented in the procession.
