CAPT. GRUMMOND DEAD. One of Detroit's dost Prominent and Re-

spected Citizens. Capt. Stephen B. Grummond died at his residence at Detroit. Some weeks since he was seized by the fatal malady, senile gangrene, and from the first little hope was entertained of his recovery. The flags of the crey-were at half-mast when the death was announced.

Stephen Benedict Grummond was born on a farm near Marine City, St. Clair county, Mich., on Sept. 18, 1834. He grew up on the farm, and when he was 15 years old he went sailing of the lakes. He continued sailing, de voting the winter months at home to his education. Before he had become age he purchased a small vessel. of age ite purchased a small vessel. In 1835 he went to Detroit, bought another vessel and within a few years had established a prosperous vessel business. It continued growing, and in the course of time Mr. Grummond in the course of sime Mr. Grummond worked up the profitable tug and wrecking business, whi h is now considered one of the largest on the chain of lakes. Capt. Grummond Mackinac. line. Capt. Grummond accumulated considerable wealth, which he invested in real estate and in business enterprises of various kinds. ness enterprises of various kinds. In 1879 he was elected member of the board of estimates, and at the expiration of his term in 1881, he was elected a member of the board of councilmen. After serving for two years in this office he was nominated for the office of mayor, to which he was elected. Capt. Grummond was a member of the police commission at the time of his death, also of lettoit Commission. posice commission at the time of his death, also of Detroit Commandery, No. J. K. T. In 1861 *Capt. Grummond married Miss Louisa B. Prouty. They were blessed with it children, seven of whom survive him.

THE INCOME TAX. The House Ways and Means Committee Fixes the Revenue Measure.

Washington special: The revenue features of the Wilson bill were finally settled at the meeting of the ways and means committee and the income tax on individuals and corporations will be the chief means of raising revenue for the necessary expenses of the government to take the place of the tariff revenues taken off. The committee joined the two propositions before them and the propositions before them and the propositions before them and tax of 2 per cent against individual in comes over \$3,000 and against the incomes from corporations (that is, the difference between the gross incommand the operating expenses, as in other words, the net income; to increase the whisky at 10 cents per gation; that is from 90 cents to \$1, to be leviced against whisky in, as well as out of bond. Upon the representation that this increase would work undue hardship to the owners of whisky in bond, it was decided to extend the bonded period from three to eight years. The tax on playing cards at one time fixed at six cents per pack, was reduced to two cents, and the tontem dated tax on perfumes and cosmetics was discarded, but the increase on cigarettee \$1 per thousand was allowed.

The committee estimate that the tax on the incomes from corporations and individuals (corporations being treated as individuals) will raise (\$30,000,000 revenue—\$12,000,000 from corporations and \$18,000,000 from individuals. The increase in the whisky tax, it is estimated, will give an additional revenue of \$10,000,000 per annum. The proposed tax on inheritances which was to be levied, in case the proposition for and individual income tax failed, was not deemed necessary.

LODGING HOUSE HOLOCAUST. Two Dead, Five Will Die and Fifteen Others Is jured at Buffalo,

Assurances have been given the men that work will be reasonably steady, as the company, is taking all the orders it can secure with the intention of operating the mills as continuously as possible. After an idleness of nearly ten months the Carrie furnace. No. 1 at Keating Station will be put in blast next week. About 300 men will be given employment. Munhall's coal works, near Homestead, will resume after being closed down for nearly five months; over 200 men will be given work.

At Johnstown: The Cambria Iron company has begun the erection of a steel rail mill, the estimated coat of

company has begun the erection of a steel rail mill, the estimated cost of which will reach \$1,000,000. There is a veritable boom in all the departments of the Gantier steel works there. It is reported that the works are two months behind orders. It is at least certain that over 1,000 men are working overtime, many making 15 hours a day.

Yellow Fever at R'o.

Cable from Buenos Ayres: Very bad news has been received from Rio de Janeiro. 


