At Detreit the Largest of the Kind th World has Ever Known---Students of

The word "welcome" was written large in their hearts, and the hospitable doors of Detroit were opened wide to them. all. The present conwide to them all. The present con vention was the only parliament in which they believed—the parliament of one religion—because there was only one Christ, and before him stood those

GREGORY STOLE THE MONEY. The Dexter Bank Robbery Mystery

Cleared Up and the Cash Recovered.

The mystery of the robbery of the Dexter Savings bank has been solved. The robbing of the bank caused great excitement, but the developments as to the robber burst upon the inhabit ants of the village like a bombshell. It was nothing more or less than the confession of Orla Gregory, the assist ant cashier of the bank, that his story of two masked men who compelled him at the point of their revolvers to open the safe was all a myth, and that he robbed the vault himself and then shut himself in the yault. The report of the factory inspection by the state labor bureau shows that 2,066 factories were inspected between Sept. 1, 1893, and Feb. 1, 1894. Of these 377, comprising many of the most important, were closed altogether, 1,117 running full time, 572 on part time. In the 2,066 factories, 48,752 men are laid off. This is more than 42 are cent of the whole number than 43 per cent of the whole number reported employed when the factories are running full capacity. Besides this loss there has been an average rethis loss there has been an average in duction of 9.5-10 per cent in wages in the factories visited. During the five months there has been a loss to labor, in 2.066 factories inspected, of a grand total of 1,763,060 working days of 10 nours each, in addition to the above

Mr. Gladstone—the Right Honorable. William E. Gladstone, prime minister, first lord of the treasury and lord of the privy seal—and Mrs. Gladstone were the guests of the queen at Windsor castle when the announcement was made and soon after the queen's private. made and soon after the queen's private secretary, Sir Henry Ponsonby, was sent to summon Lord Roseberry to Windsor. It was not long afterward when the news came that Lord Rose-

when the news came that Lord Rose-berry had accepted the position vacated by Mr. Gladstone.

It is freely asserted that Lord Roseberry and the Liberal party will have to face a grave crisis after the retirement of Mr. Gladstone. 






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
