BRAZIL'S INSURGENTS FORCED TO SURRENDER.

Rlo de Janeire Rejoices Over the End o a Costly but Meaningless Strugg'e-Rebel Officers Flee on Foreign War. thips-The last Battle.

Washington special: Advices re-Minister Thompson at lilio de Janeiro indicates that the Brazilian rebellion is about ended. BRITISH TROOPS LANDED WITH GATLING GUNS.

The British claim to a protectorate over these Indians is very old, but was never-recognized by the United States or Nicaragua, and has apparently once been fally surrendered by Great Brittanics says: "The Mosquito reserve had enjoyed a semi-independent position under the nominal protection of Great Britain from 1833 to 1850.
