GREAT COAL MINERS STRIKE TAKES EFFECT.

The great strike of bituminous coal miners, ordered by the recent national souvention of the United Mine workers at Columbus, O. has gone into effect, and reports from the various fields affected show that from 125,000 to 130,000 miners have laid down their picks and thereby asked for better wages. President John McBride, of Columbus, O., the head of the United Mine workers of America, says: "My hopes of success are most sanguine. The miners have laid down, no plans and have no particular course to do! any fair proposition for settlement or emergency of whatever character may arise. We will be ready to meet the operators to confer with we ference to an adjustment of the differences at any time. I believe that 132,000 miners time. I believe that 132,000 miners are out, and that by May 1 that number will be increased to 150,000. In reference to the 135,000 anthracite miners, I cannot say whether they will strike or not. They may, however, as that question is being agitated in the anthracite fields."
