OVER 100 PEOPLE INJURED

Explosion of a Huge Tank of Be zine at a Fire in Bradford, Pa.

The barrel house at Emery's refinery, at Bradford, Pa, was destroyed by fire. The loading racks and five oil tank cars standing on a side track were also burned. The fire was a fierce one, and attracted immense crowds of people. While the firemen were making a final stand and thousands of people. people. While the firemen were making a final stand and thousands of people were watching them, there was a tremendous explosion. A tank car holding 4,100 gallons of benzine let go with a mighty roar. A crowd of sight-seers were within a hundred feet of the tank when it exploded, but most of the firemen were massed within half, that distance. The latter were covered by the first flash of the explosion, but the greater distance separating the front ranks of spectators from the exploding tank saved them. There were many displays of nerve and unselfish courage, as well as the senseless display of seifish cowardice.

The explosion was followed by a panic. In the stampede men as well as women and children were thrown down and trodden over by the flying masses. Thirty-five of the firemen were burned so that the skin peeled off their faces and hands and the hair was singed off their heads and faces. The total number of those burned and injured in the stampede will reach a hundred persons. With all the suffering the property loss did not exceed \$5,000.

100 BUILDINGS BURNED.

Big Blaze at Boston Burns. Base Sall Bulldings. 500 People Homeless.

Over \$1,000,000 worth of property was reduced to ashes in Boston by an incendiary fire. The first started in the Boston league ball park in a pile of lumber, which was lying under the bleachers directly back of first base. In a moment it had leaped out to the seats, and, fanned by a brisk breeze, swept towards the grand stand. So seats, and, fanned by a brisk preeze, swept towards the grand stand. So rapidly did the flames spread that before the occupants of the grand stand realized it—the fire was upon and they were forced to flee. It stand realized it—the fire was upon them, and they were forced to fiée. It was several minutes before the firemen were at work and meanwhile the sparks had fallen upon the houses on Berlin street, and the flames surged on towards Tremont street, reaching out to the right and left until they soon engulfed the buildings for four blocks. By this time the secilests of soon engulied the buildings for four blocks. By this time the residents of the tenements for nearly half a mile-around had become alarmed and were removing all their property into the streets and seeking for places of safety. So rapidly did the fire eat, its way, however, that those in the blocks adjoining Tremont street did not have time to save their household effects and barely escaped with their lives. The streets were filled with the frightened women and children, poor people who were trying to save a part of their small property.

Y., was doomed to destruction. Adjoining the church was the Hotel Regent, eight stories in hight, with a frontage of 90 feet on Clinton avenue and extending back 200 feet to Waverly avenue. The fire spread from the Tabernacle to this hotel and then to the dwelling houses on Greene avenue and Waverly avenue. stroyed-A Loss of Over \$1,000,000 on Greene avenue and Waverly avenue opposite the church. The wind carried the blazing cinders in such quantities in a southeasterly direction that dwelling houses on Washington avenue, two squares away and also the Summerfield Methodist church were set on fire by them. The total loss reaches over \$1,000,000.

It was nearly 20 minutes before the firemen arrived on the scene and then half a hundred streams of water were turned upon the blazing pite. But the church was doomed and every effort was devoted to saving adjoining property. The streets were filled with the frightened women and children, poor people who were trying to save a part of their small property.


