FIFTY WERE DROWNED

A passenger boat returning to Westport quay from Johil. of harvesters who were on their way to Scotland. A passenger boat returning to Westport quay, from Achilisland, having our board eighty harvesters who were to be shipped to Scotland from Westport, capsized. According to the first reports of the disaster 30 out of the 80 passengers were drowned, but later advices say that it is believed that 50 of the harvesters lost their lives. All the victims were young people and were of both sexes. London: Lord Chief Justice Cole-John Duke Coleridge was the son of John Taylor Coleridge, a distinguished English jurist and a nephew of Samuel Taylor Coleridge, the poet. He was horn in Devonshire in 1821, and educated at Eaton and Oxford, receiving the degree of M. A. in 1846. He entered parliament in 1865 as a Liberal member from Exeter. In 1830, on the death of Sir Alex Cochran, he became Lord Chief Justice of England. 


