When the mercury takes a tumble of 25 to 40 degrees in six hours in what is termed in school geographies the "temperate zone" it leads one to suspect that old Mother Earth has slipped a cog, and when the inhabitants of the sunny south feel frosty zoro weather nipping their extremities they think "things is gettin" interestin"." egrees in 15 minutes.

In Michigan. Grand Rapids had a taste of 8 below zero wind, and had it not been for a heavy fall of snow wheat and fruit would have suffered severely. Benton Harbor had 15 below zero. Coldwater's experience was 14 below; Dowagiac 18, and so on over the southern part of the state. In the upper peninsula snow fell to a depth of three feet and mercury ran down almost out of sight. Farm Products Have Dropped. The Mich gan crop report for January says that a total of 6.235,103 bushels of wheat was marketed in the five els of wheat was marketed in the five months. - ENGLISH MINE HORROR. 50 Men in a Colliery When It Becar

London: A frightful-accident oc-curred at the Dig Lake colliery, at Audrey. North Staffordshire, which may result in the loss of 120 human lives. About 250 men and boys were at work in the colliery when, about noon, there came a sudden rush of waters from the old workings. About 70 men reached the slope and were hoisted out of danger, but the rushing waters cut off the rest. The question which lead to the resignation of the ministry is a wide one. It is really a question of whether the chamber of deputies is superior to the courts of france and whether the chamber is able to set aside the con-






