State Banking Commissioner T. C. Sherwood has submitted to Gov. Rich Sherwood has submitted to Gov. Rich his sixth annual report of the business of that department. He says that while 1894 was comparatively free from the financial panies of 1893, the shrinkage in values and general depression in business made greater care and watchfulness more necessary than ever before. There were nine new banks incorporated during the year, with a capital of \$292,000. There were three failures in the state during the year, but one of which, the Commercial and Savings bank of Ludington, was under this department's care. The assets of this bank were \$178, 421.78, and liabilities \$124,749.85, and to A. E. Cartier, the president, is due

ton, was inder this bank were \$178,421.78, and liabilities \$134,749.85, and to A. E. Cartier, the president, is due great honor for his having; personally, made good all loses to depositors.

Of three state banks in the hands of receivers, the Milford state bank depositors have received a 15 per cent dividends during the year. Forty-four per cent in dividends has been paid depositors of the Central Michigan savings bank and \$20,480.66 is on hand in cash available for a sixth dividend. The bank of Crystal Falls paid three dividends aggregating 40 per cent. Mr. Sherwood thinks there is too much, rather than too little, banking legislation, and makes a few suggestions: To prohibit a director from borrowing from his bank would be imprudent, but they should be barred from using the bank's money to the exclusion of other patrons; private banks should be prohibited from using corporate names such as "city bank" "exchange bank," etc.; building and loan associations should be placed under the supervision of the state banking department. The receipts of the department during the year were \$7.760.24, and the expenses, including Mr. Snerwood's salary of \$2,500, were \$9,342.02.

As an outcome of the street car men's strike at Brooklyn, and the determined attitude of the companies not to give in, there is very serious trouble on hand. The strikers and their sympathizers became riotous and blockaded street car traffic in every possible. The tracks were piled with umber, barrels, old iron and rubbish of all kinds, the trolley wires were cut and the cars were made the targets for bricks, clubs and stones until they had not a pane of glass remaining in their windows. New men who at-

Royalists Attack Government Officers U. S. Warships Sail for Honolulu.

San Francisco: The steamer Ala-meda has arrived from Auckland and sydney via Honolulu and brings news of a resolution and bloodshed at Hono-lulu. Charles L. Carter, who was one of the annexation commissioners, was of the annexation commissioners, was killed and other government supporters were wounded. There has been much fighting and at least twelve natives have been killed. Nearly 200 royalists are under arrests. Robert Wilcox is the leader of the rebels. The fighting was still in progress when the Alameda left Honolulu on Jan. 11, but the government forces had practically overcome the revolutionists.

Nowlein and R. W. Wilcox. Hon. C. L. Carter, late commissioner, was killed first night. Desultory lighting every day since, without turther loss of life or property to government. Three royalists killed and 50 taken prisoners. Over 50 non-combatants, mostly whites, arrested, including three ex-attorney-generals and many prominent citizens. Martial law declared January 7. No vessels allowed to leave. All other islands reported quick. Crisis though to be over, but excitement stilliginense.





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
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
