That Detroit Mystery Cleared Up. The mysterious "Myrtle Cooke" case which has been the sensation of De which has been the sensation of Detroit for over two weeks, has at last been cleared up, and the old adage, "marder will out," has again proven true. It will be remembered that the girl died at a lying in hospital, Feb. 3, and two months later it was accidentally discovered that the body was being kept by an undertaker to experiment with a new embaliming fluid. Mrs. Lane, who runs he hospital; Dr. Seaman, who attended the girl, did some tall lying, sa ing that they did not know where the girl came from that they only knew her name was "Myrtle Cooke," and that she died from natural causes. Bell had sent the girl to Detroit to have an operation performed, and this was done by Dr. Seaman and she died as a result.
