Hughson Acquitted of the -Gen. Devlin, Quartermaster-G of the Michigan National Guard, is Dead

The exciting trial of Mrs. Mary Hughson at Muskegon, on the charge of poisoning her former husband Nathan Douglass—in order to obtain possession of his property and life insurance, resulted in a verdict of not guilty. He arried \$2,000 insurance in the Macabees, and his beneticiary was Miss Eunice Williams, his sister. It was claimed by the prosecution that Mrs. Rissons married Douglas and the projection with King, poisoned him by giving him arcenic in his beer. The motive was to gam the old man's property and life insurance which had been transferred to his wife by a will which King drafted. Gen. Devlin Desd Gen G. M. Devlin died at his residence at Jackson from Bright's disease, after an illness of nearly three weeks. He had been in poor health,

ease, after an illness of nearly three weeks. He had been in poor health, however, for about a year.

Gen. Devlin was born in Oregon, Wis, Aug. S. 1946, and with his parents removed to Obtoin the time of the college, where he was pursuing his studies when the rebellion broke out. Though but 15 years old, he tendered his services to his country and served through the war. After the war he returned to his studies at Oberin and graduated with honors. About 25 years ago he removed to Jackson and established a college that has grown to considerable proportions. The first identification of Gen. Devlin with the military of the state was upon his appointment as adjusted to two years. He was adde upon the staff of Gov. Aiger, and was appointed quartermastergeneral by Gov. Luce, holding the office unit the accession of Gov. Winans. Again, in 1892, he was reappointed to the same position by Gov. Kich, which office he held at the time of his death. He was a prominent worker in the G. A. R., and was at one time commander of Edward Pomeroy Post of Jackson.
