Michigan Grangers Meet.

The annual meeting of the Michigan State Grange was held at Lansing. In his annual address Grand Master George B. Horton, of Fruit Ridge, raked the Agricultural college over the coals, saying it was away behind the times. Among the other speakers were Gov. Rich, State Food and Dairy Commissioner Stores, State Statistician De Land, and Mrs. Lillian Spencer, state librarian. A reception was held at Gov. Rich so office. Reports of, several subordinate officers show, for the year, a very prosperous condition of the order.

An overwhelming flood of resolutions and memorials was presented, covering a multitude of questions. The report of the executive Committee demanded the passage by congress of the bill indorsed at the recent farmers congress at Atlanta, which provides for the free and unlimited coinage of gold and silver of American production, and the placing on all foreign gold and silver of American production, and the placing on all foreign gold and silver of American gold and silver on the day of importation. The report attributes the general business depression to the demonetization of silver in 1873, and other unwise legislation, while the opening of new agricultural districts in various parts of the world and the increase of laborsaving machinery has aided in depressing the prices of farm products. The passage of a law requiring the payment of all coin obligation of the government in silver, when the gold reserve is below \$100,000,000, is demanded, and the issuing of interesting bearing bonds to pay the ordinary expenses of the government is opposed, as is the proposed

000,000, is demanded, and the issuing of interesting bearing bonds to pay the ordinary expenses of the government is opposed, as is the proposed retirement of greenbacks. Congress is asked to empower the secretary of the treasury to issue non-interest bearing, legal tender treasury notes, to meet deficiencies in the public revenue, and it is demanded that the government cease guaranteeing national bank notes and buying up gold for importers of foreign merchandise. Cubans Continue to Invade the Spanis minent-Another Big Bond Issue Ex

Havana: The insurgents, in spite of the reports of their defeats, have crossed the military lines between the city of Santa Clara and Cientuegos, the dquarters, of Gen. Campos, and

city of Santa Clara and Ciembos, and their advance guards are now in sight of Las Lajas, well to the westward of Santa Clara, showing that the Spaniards have been utterly unable to check their progress since they crossed the frontier of Santa Clara, from Puerto Principe, at Iguara.

The battle of Maltiempo, half way between the city of Santa Clara and Cienfuegos, in which, according to an account received here, a Spanish force of 500 troops under Col. Arizon is said to have met the main body of the insurgents under Maximo Gomez, numbering about 6,000 men, was followed by another engagement at Peraljo, where the troops are said to have Tost 65 killed and the insurgents had 300 killed and wounded. These "repulses" of the insurgents have not prevented of the insurgents have not prevented them from pushing of ward and so the Spanish forces must be in retreat or defeated beyond concentration. The combined armies of Macco' and Gomez combined armies of Maceo and Gomez are said to be making for the province of Havana. Near Matanzas, a decisive battle must be fought or else the Spaniards must retreat upon. Havana itself, Gen. Allen Granberry Thurman, the noblest Roman of them all, was \$2 years old Nov 13 For nearly \$4 years he was a power in the politics of his state or of the nation. His last great public appearance was when he ran for vice president on the ticket with Cleveland in 1888. He made many speeches during that campaign, devoting himself particularly to the tarrif question, which had been made the great issue by Cleveland's famous message to congress. He was bore in Lynchburg. Va., Nov. 31, 1813. In 1819 his parents removed to Ohio, where he received an academic education and was admitted to the bar in 1835. He was selected to the twenty-ninth congress (1845 to 1847). In 1811 he was elected a justice of the Ohio supreme court, and from 1854 to 1856 was its chief justice. In 1857 he was the party's candidate for the governorship, but was defeated. 


