NEW ITEMS OF VARIOUS KINDS BRIEFLY RELATED.

Sentiment for International Bimetallism Increasing in Great Britain-A Crank Attempted to Assassinate President Faure, of France.

International Bimetallism Progressing The Bimetallic League of Great Britain held its annual meeting at London. The annual report declares that the cause of international bimetalism has made substantial propress during the year, both in Great Britain and abroad. It mentions the resolutions adopted by the chamber of deputies in France, the chamber of representatives in Belgium and the Prussian diet, declaring for bimetalism and con-tinues: "In the United States all parties and classes would welcome inter-national bimetallism. A large section of the people there are however, so strongly convinced of the urgent necessity for the remonetization of silver that they are indisposed to wait for an international agreement." A letter read from Lord Aldenham, president of the league in which he congratulates the members upon the progress which has been made in the United States. "It is indeed a striking fact," Lord Aldenham wrote, "that this question, which some here affect to treat with contempt should be apparently the main political question before a nation of 70,000,000 people."

Yellow Fever Worse Than War.

Advices from Havana say that a panic prevails in the Spanish army in conse quence of the terrible increase of yellow fever. It is estimated that fully 40 per cent of the cases prove fatal. In Santiago de Cuba there are over 4,500 soldiers in the hospitals. Maj. Gen. Linares is stricken and his life is despaired of. The physicians and nurses are utterly incapable of coping with the disease. The epidemic is also very serious all along the trocha. In Lima, O., and vicinity. NEW BICYCLE CATAMARAN. Latest Invention Is in the Way of a

The latest invention in the way of a bicycle novelty of practical service is the bicycle boat. It is different from any other boat. It is different from any other boat, because it is driven by what may be called a water bicyle, but for the reason that it consists of two boats and is really a bicyle catamaran. The new boat is the invention of a man in Detroit, and he save that it is going to be the biggest success of the year. The boat consists of two canoes arranged side by side with a frame similar to a diamond frame of a bicycle between them. The frame is: pivoted to the boats and is equipped with an ordinary bicycle seat, a pair of pedals, sprocket wheels and chain. In place of the ordinary tired wheels aretwo miniature paddle wheels, which propel the boat through the water-The inventor is able to use one or more paddle wheels at the same time. The outfit is further equipped with steering gear and a rudder that works quickly and surely, both of which are operated by the handle bars. The bicycle boat is of such light construction and so low on the water that it cannot be used where the water is apt to be rough. It has been tried at Detroit in smooth water and worked very successfully. The inventor seated himself just as would a bicycle rider who was about to indulge in a spin on the road. With the same motion and effort expended in driving a bicycle the boat was forced through the water at a fair



Dogs, little and big we all know, are taxed. Tobacco is doubly taxed there being a manufacturing duty and a retail license. One must not shoot game or sell it without special licenses, and to blaze away at the humble sparrow entails a gun tax. An endeavor to "lighten our darkness" involves the gas rate. Uncle who receives a family plate or jewelry in pledge has to be provided with both pawnbroker's and plate certificates. The clergy are entitled to certain fees or the burial of their parishioners. When the burial is in a cemetery the chaplain attached to it performs the service. After paying his salary the established ministers collect the balrance of the fees for themselves, thus levying a tax on every corpse in their parishes. While hunting one day in Bombay after the tigers had been he was in a tree and by accident fell from it. A huge tiger that had been much harassed and was in a decidedly ugly mood attacked him. He had all he could do to dodge it and came near being killed. He would not have escaped, either, according to the story, had it not been for the prompt aid of others. As it was the tiger was at length killed. The major is reputed to be a dead shot and one of the most skillful hunters who has ever tackled big jungle game. Maj. Johnson said he had had some close brushes with tigers when formerly stationed in India with the army, but that he did not hunt any on this trip. "My tiger hunting," he said, "consisted of going after the man-eaters. There are a good many of them in Bombay, and I did have one or two pretty narrow escapes from them. MUSIC FOR ANGLEWORMS. Singular Story of Fisherman's Luck from

the Hills of Maine. Josiah Crewdye, a farmer living three miles from Lewistown, enjoys the reputation of being the only angleworm raiser in Maine. "He occupies an old farm and uses a sort of primitive hothouse for his worm colony. The box in which he kept them covered the floor of the old forcing-house, and was built four feet deep and filled with soil to

within eighteen inches of the top. 
