Can and Have Called Upon Greece for Help Canea and Several Other Towns Almost Destroyed by Fire.

passed by the Senate. Senator Thompson, of Wayne, presented a very important bill providing for the initiative and referendum in state, county and indreds of Christians Murder municipal government. Senator For-Advices received from the island of rete are to the effect that serious syth rouble has occurred at Canea as a result of the massacre of 27 Christians in several villages by moslems under pro-bection of Turkish troops. The Christ-ans armed themselves and attacked the troops and fighting continued several days, and it was observed that the Turkish soldiers themselves fired from the ramparts on the heads of the Christians. Several villages were de-stroyed by fire. Canea itself is in a tate of revolt. The commanders of the Italian and French gunboats at-tempted to stop the fighting and landed detachments of soldiers. The Christians at Halepa sought refuge at the office of the foreign consuls and on board the gunboat. Most of the Christians at Canea and the archives of the consulates have been placed on board the warships. Two thousand Christians have gone aboard the British ves sels, while 200 subjects of France went abound the French cruiser. The total number of victims of the fight is esti-

Christians Hoist the Greek Flag. Later dispatches from Canea say that the Christians about Canea have hoisted the Greek flag, have proclaimed the union of that island with Greece and have invited the king of Greece to take session of it.

The Cretan committee at Athens has issued a proclamation addressed to the people of Greece, calling for assistance from all freemen. The Greek squadron on arriving at Canes did not salute the Canea say that fighting outside the visional Cretan government is being formed. The fires which were started as a result of the conflict have been completely extinguished. By far the larger portion of the town is, however, a heap of ruins. Official advices say that the Mussulmans are preparing a massacre at Retimo. The Turks have been expelled from Halepa by a strong orce and the inhabitants of the town of Sphakia, on the southern coast of Crete, are now engaged in a desperate struggle to regain possession of the place. Geo. Edward Butler, the famous Australian murderer, was captured when the ship Swanhilds arrived at San Francisco. Butler is charged by the Australian police with having murdered 14 men. SENATE-42d day-The senate was in executive session most of the day considering the Anglo-American arbitration treaty. The bill rearranging the judicial districts of Texas was passed over the President's veto by the ma-jority of 57 to l. House—The whole day was devoted to District of Columpia business and eight bills of more or less importance were passed.

SENATE-43d day -- The entire day was spent in executive session in consideration of the Anglo-American arbiration treaty, and Senator Morgan, of Alabama, occupied the floor nearly all day. He offered an amendment to the treaty which provides for the abrogation of the Clayton-Bulwer treaty. House—The final conference report on the immigration bill was agreed to by an overwhelming majority-217 to 33and the House passed two more pension bills over the President's veto. The modification of the immigration bill contained in the conference report by which an intending immigrant was required to be able to read and write English or another language, and which permitted the illiterate wife and minor children to accompany aneligible immigrant removed the main opposition to the bill.
