

FRENCH INCOME TAX.

The New Scheme Bow the

Some particulars have been made public of the income-tax scheme which will be submitted to the chamber of deputies by M. Peytral, the minister of finance, says the London Post. The tax, it was known, was to have for its basis the "external signs of wealth." The rent paid by the taxpayer will be the principal point taken into consideration by the taxgatherers, but such ndications as the number of servants kept, carriages, horses, autocars, yachts, pet dogs, parks, gardens, ponds, and lakes will not be overlooked. The percentage is to be settled yearly by the financial bill. The minister of finance proposes to fix it the first year at 21/4 according to the foregoing indications. The mode of computation in Paris will he as follows: There are five classes represented by figures 4, 41/2, 5, 8 and 10. The figure 4 in Paris represents the lowest class, with a rental of 500 francs. This sum multiplied by 4 gives the taxable income as 2,000 francs. But the principle adopted is that every one whose income does not exceed 2,000 francs is exempt from income The progressive character of the tax is arranged thus; Assuming the you know. income to be, say, 6.000 francs, no charge is made on the first 2,000 francs, the second 2,000 france is assessed at france at the full rate of 4% per ce one tenth to every family having of a receiver
