





Cut Off Without Compunction or Care. What becomes of a badly wounded man on board of a sailing ship worst of all, a sailing stip in regions far from other hann a help file those visited by whalers in the Arctic and Antarctic regions. A striking answer to this question has just been given by Surgeon S. J. Call of the revenue cutter service of the United States in his report just published of the trip of the overland relief expedition to Point Barrow, Alaska; to succor the whalers who were frozen in there, says the Phila delphia Press. The vast difficulties at tending the overland journey made it absolutely impossible to carry any except desperately needed medical stores and Surgeon Call's outfit consisted of a pocket surgical case, a hypodermisyringe, a stethescope, a half-pound package of lint, a roll of adhesive rubber plaster, a fever thermometer, dozen assorted bandages, a half roll of isinglass plaster, one-half pairs snow glasses and one-third of dozen tooth brushes. On account of the low temperature to be met, the liquid preparations were reduced to a mini mum, and were eight ounces of specia anesthetic mixture, four ounces tinc chloride of iron, four ounces of friar's balsam, and one-third dozen of extract of ginger.
