PENSION ROLL GROWS:

Secretary's Report Shows 45,344 New Names.

AN INCREASE OF 2,010 NAMES

Five of Our Little Cockleshell Boats Have Been Ordered to the Philippines to do Fatrol Duty as per the Request of Admiral Remey.

45,344 New Names on Pension Roll. The report of the secretary of the interior shows that on June 30, 1899, there were 991,519 pensioners borne upon the roll. During the fiscal year ended June 30, 1900, there were allowed 40,645 pensions on original applications, and the number restored to the rolls was 4,669, making a total of new names added to the rolls of 45,344. The pensioners dropped from the rolls during the year by reason of death and all other causes aggregated 43,334, leaving the number remaining on rolls June 30, 1900, 993,529, a net increase of 2,010 as compared with the previous fiscal year, 1899. 




