Cov. Pingree Gets a Warning.

Gov. Pingree failed to appear in the Ingham county circuit court on the 29th in answer to the citation issued by Judge Wiest for contempt of court. The court room was crowded with Lansing citizens. C. H. Wisner, of Flint, judge of the 6th judicial circuit, assumed the bench 15 minutes after the hour appointed and in the midst of general silence made this judicial utterance: "I understand that at this hour Hazen S. Pingree was cited to appear and show cause why he should not be punished for an alleged con-tempt of court. It appears on the re-turn of the sheriff on file in this matter that on Dec. 24 he served the petition and papers, made a part thereof, upon one Hazen S. Pingree, of Detroit, and at the same time delivered to him a copy and affidavits in support thereof." Gov. Pingree having failed to appear, Judge Wisner at once ad-journed the case until Jan. 9, at which time the governor must appear or an attachment for him will be issued. The proceedings on Jan. 9 will be treated as if against a private citizen of the state, instead of the chief executive.

But he has not yet been successful in expelling them from Cape Colony, while small commandoes continue to display astonishing daring and activity over an immensely wide It is questionable whether his proclain tion will have much effect until Gen. Da Wet has been captured. The Boers are likely to regard it as a sign of weakness and to have a whole-some dread of De Wet's vengeance if

Lord Kitchener, according to a dispatch from Johannesburg, has issued a proclamation, dated Pretoria, Dec. 20, announcing that burghers coluntarily surrender will be allowed to live with their families in the government laagers until such time as guerrilla warfare has sufficiently abated to admit of their returning in safety to their homes. The proclama-tion also promises that all property and stock brought in at the time of surrender will be respected and paid for if requisitioned by the military




