So Far as the State Ticket is Concerned.

PLURALITY IS OVER 67,000

Amendments Have Been Lost - The Van Buren County Seat Fight Resulted in a

Republicans Win in the State. Voters throughout the state were apathetic on the 1st and their indiffernce result d in a light vote being polled. Jurtice Robert M. Montgom ery is re-elected to the supreme court bench by a plurality of more than 67,-000. The Republican candidates for regents of the University of Michigan, Frank W. Fletcher, of Alpena, and Henry W. Carey, of Manistee, will not run far behind the head of the ticket. From meager reports received it is more than probable that the legislative salary and the Bay county court amendments to the constitution were amendments to the constitution were defeated. For the state ticket Wayne county went overwhelmingly Repub-lican. Montgomery, for supreme court justice, and Fletcher and Carey for regents of the university, carried every

ward in the city.
Probably the most interesting fight in the state was over the Van Buren county seat. According to returns. Paw Paw wins a victory by 500 votes. More votes were cast in this county than at a presidential election.

Exciting Election at Jerome.

The people of Jerome have voted the consolidation of their four school districts, and the result of the vote has been sent to Lansing in the hope that the consolidation act will be repealed before the legislature adjourns. The act was slipped through the legislature early in the session and when its provisions became gener ally known a howl of indignation arose. In January Aguinaldo, from his hiding place, wrote letters anathematizing the Filipinos who had taken the oath of allegiance to the U. S. DOINGS OF THE 41ST SESSION.

In view of the talk to the effect that there is a scheme to secure a 30-year 5-cent fare street railway franchise be hind the Ames bill, abolishing off year municipal elections in Detroit and extending the present terms of half the aldermen and other city officers one year, Rep. Baumann had an important action taken in the house on the 26th. He got the house committee on city corporations to have the house order printed 500 copies of his bill requiring all proposed street railway franchise anywhere in the state to be submitted to a vote of the people before they can be granted by common councils and

other municipal bodies. The house on the 26th passed th following bills: Authorizing the high-way commissioner to lay out a highway where it is necessary to make the same of the full width of four rods; to authorize suits to be brought against insurance companies organized in this state in the circuit court of any county in which the plantiff shall reside; appropriating \$11,500 for the state normal school at Marquette; to amend the charter of the city of Crystal Falls'in Iron county; incorporating the public schools of Bad Axe. Huron county: providing that all lands in Muskegor county, on which taxes are not paid to the state, to be sold every two years, instead of every year; authorizing the township board of Calumet in Houghton county, to issue orders for the time when animals shall be restrained from going at large in the highways; providing for the appointment of guardians for habitual drunkards and that every person so appointed by the judge of probate, shall take the patient to a hospital or suitable asylum for medical or sanitary treatment; giving the land commissioner the power to withdraw lands from sale in order to re-estimate the value of primary school and swamp, and other state lands.
