The first three named are running practically full and new men are being taken on every day.

Disastrous Rains.

Reports state the heavy rainse which have faiten almost incessantly during the past week throughout Fennessivania have resulted in the most disastrous flood experienced in many years. At Manch Churk, the storm was attended by four fatalities. Jesse Struthers, a prominent citizen of Mauch Churk, and three boys named McClaffery, McGinley and Johnson, were standing on a bridge-spanning Mauch Churk creek when the supports collapsed and the four were precipitated into-the water and drowned. At Wilkesbarre a landslide occurred along the Lehigh Valley railroad at the castern approach of the Vosburg tunnel, and traffic was suspended for several hours. A washend on the Sunbury branch of the Pennsylvania railroad delayed traffic several hours. In Shamokin: Tamaqua, Pittston and other mining towns, many cellieries have been fleeded and work has been suspended. The Schrylkill river and the Panther and Wabash creeks at Tamaqua are loverflowing their banks and many bridges have been washed away. All the colleries in the Panther creek valley are flooded. Crops in the Capiwissa valley, a farming section, are practically ruined. The storm will cost Bedford county thousands of dollars to replace bridges washed away and damage done to roads. In some townships it will be necessary to lay a special tax to meet the expenses. One of the heaviest loses washed awas fine flamaged by high water. The Continent Alarmed.

Senator Chauncey M. Depew, speaking of the inroads made upon European commercial life by American competi-tion and energy, said: "There is a genuine scare on the continent about the competition of American manufac turers in their markets, and cabinets are consulting if any combination is practical which will prevent the impor-tation of American goods and check or invasion of the east, which has been opened at such vast expense and effort by European governments. I heard a Russian statesman say. Concert of action may be impossible, but Russia, in response to discriminating duties; has shown how each country in its own way can stop this competition.'

governments are too intricate and uncertain among themselves for anyone to take that risk, and combination is impossible."




