The findings of the Schley court of inquiry were handed to the secretary of the navy Friday. Two reports were submitted, the majority opinion drawn up by Rear-Admirals Benham and up by Rear-Admirals Benham and Ramsey, holding Schley at fault on 11 points, and the minority report pre-sented by Admiral Dewey, sustaining Schley in nearly every particular, and emphatically asserting that to him was due all the credit of the victory of Santiago. When the conclusions of Admiral Schley showed his pleasure, and it was evident from his manner that he regarded the statement form had he regarded the statement from miral Dewey as a vindication of his cause. Awful Death Rate. 
