A Very Mysterious Death In St. Joseph.

A SUIT FOR FIVE MILLIONS.

Must Stay in House of Correction-A Child Wife Indeed-Matters of Note

Suit for \$5,000,000

Suit has been filed in Toledo by Austin B. Fletcher, of New York, on behalf of the creditors and stockholders of the Ann Arbor railroad, against Wellington R. Burt, of Saginaw, pres-Wellington R. Burt, of Saginaw, president of the road, asking judgment for \$5,000,000. The petition avers that Burt, as receiver of the road, mismanaged the property, concealing the amounts of money that he paid for improvements with the intention of depreciating the price of the property in the market in order that he and his associates might buy in the same at a low price. In consequence of his representations it is claimed that Burt and his associates bought it in for \$2. and his associates bought it in for \$2,-627,000. They immediately issued \$7,000,000 of bonds against it and \$7,250. 000 of stock. Plaintiff seeks to recover in his own behalf and in behalf of all the creditors and stockholders the amount of their damage by the sale of the property.

Small Rural Schools.
