






A-The method of "unrolling" and laying the felt. B-Showing "lap" of to width over lower one. C-Showing "splice" of the







THE SUNDAY SCHOOL.

LESSON II, OCT. 12; 4134HUA 3:9-17 -CROSSING THE ORDAN.

Text-"V/hen Thou Passest Through the Waters, ! Will Be With Thee, and Through the Rivers, They Shall Not Overflow Thee."-Isaiah

I. The General Situation. The Position of Israel. The children of Israel were encamped on a broad fertile plain on the eastern or Moabite side of the Jordan, about one hundred and fifty feet above the usual level of the Jordan, with the mountains of Moab behind them and the flooded river, before them, with Jeticho six or seven miles distant from the river on the other side. The plain where they were encamped was from five to seven miles wide.




