York-Republicans Made Gains in Ohio -Republicans will have Good Working

Forty-two states held elections Tuesday. Maine, Vermont and Oregon had already chosen their state officials and representatives in the fifty-eighth congress. Nine states only elected congressmen; eleven chose minor state officials and congressmen, while the other 22 elected governors, other state officials and congressmen.

Governors and other state officers were chosen in Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York, South Carolina, Alabama, Texas, Michigan, Kansas, Minnesota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Wisconsin, North Dakota, Colorado, Wyoming, Nevada and California. New Hampshire elects only a governor; Tennessee a governor and railroad commissioner, and Pennsylvania a governor and two other state Minor state officials or justices c.

the supreme court were voted for in Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Ohio, Iowa, Florida, North Carolina, Delaware Utah Washington and Montana.
Congressmen only were selected in
Arkansas, Georgia, Mississippi, Louis-iana, West Virginia, Virginia, Mary-land, Kentucky and New Jersey and delegates in Arizona, Hawaii, Mexico, Oklahoma and Porto Rico.
