

The Injured Battleshin. The injuries to the battleship Massa chusetts caused by striking on Egs Rock shoal, on the coast of Maine, are

more serious than the first examina-tion indicated. Not only are the for-ward compartments full of water, but ward compartments rul of water, but the ship-is-leaking farther aft. She floats in a natural position, but is drawing about ten inches more water than usual. (Considering the great-weight that was taken from her by the collier and tug, it is very evident that an enormous quantity of water must be inside in order to put a ship of her size down ten inches. The anchorage was changed so that the ship might be in shallow water in case she leaked worse and sank. Orders have been sent to the Brooklyn navy yard to get the dock there in readiness to he Massachusetts which is to go there for re-pairs. One hundred thousand dollars was spent on Massachusetts when she grounded in New York harbor in 1890.

The pilot of the vessel was suspended One Hundred Perished.

Eighty-four bodies have been recovred and the death list probably will exceed 100 in the underground disaster which occurred on the Metropolitan electric railway in Paris Monday night. Although the accident occurred at 8 o'clock Monday evening the officials and firemen were unable, until early Tuesday morning to descend into the tunnel owing to the blinding clouds of smoke from the burning train. Frequent attempts to enter the tunnel were made by heroic rolunteers, whom it was necessary to rescue, half sufficated, and carry away to the hospitals. The scenes at the mouth of the tunnel where the victims were brought forth were heart-rending, crowds of weeping men, women and children strug gling in an effort to recognize their missing relatives and friends. Most of the victims are from the middle and working classes as the trains were





Act No. 134, session of 1903, repeals Act No. 199 of 1901 and requires the librarian of each public library, whether township, school district, village, or city, to report annually to the county commissioner of schools on or before the 30th day of June in each year, in regard-to the condition and support of the library. and requires the county commissioner to file the reports with the state board of library commissioners before the first day of September in each year. All librarians of Washtenaw county should send in the reports of their libraries to the county school commissioner at once to insure their drawing the proper share of the library fund. The directors of the school districts are considered the librarians of their schools. If they have not received the blank forms on which to make a report they can get them by writing the school commissioner. Librarice having less than 50 volumes need not report.
