An Hiegal Trust.

The U. S. supreme court handed down a decision favorable to the government in the Northern Securities case, Monday, declaring the merger to be in violation of the anti-trust laws. The decision was read by Justice Harlan. The suit was instituted by the United States against the Northern Securities Co. and the two railroad companies, the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern and their leading stockholders, for the purpose of dissolving the merger of the two roads, which, the United States chimed had been created by the formation of a holding company, the Securities company. This consolidation was claimed to be in violation of the Sterman anticitrust law. It was claimed on behalf of the government that this consolidation was in effect a pool created to promote the interests not of one securities. tion was in effect a pool created to promote the interests, not of one sys-tem at the expense of the other, but of both at the expense of the public. The railroads claimed that the transfer of the stock of the two companies to the Securities company was in the nature of a sale and perfectly legiti-
