

About Fire Insurance.

To the Editor; Considerable inquiry has been made of me regarding the course taken by the insurance companies, or their representatives, in settling the loss I incurred by fire on the 19th of last

Thinking my experience with these people may be of some benefit to other policy holders, I will suggest a few things that should be done.

1st. Read the policy over carefully so as to be familiar with each clause and agreement between you and the company.

2nd. Have a plan of your house, with specifications and description, together with estimate of cost. Also have an inventory of everything in the house from

a shoe string to the piano. In case of loss, take good care of everything saved and uninjured and place the damaged goods to one side, check the saved and damaged goods from the in ventory, make out a list of what was lost and price it at its true cash value. adding to this a fair amount for damages on goods saved. Do all this at once and when the adjuster comes, if settlement is not made, demand of him a blank form, which they baye, for filing a formal proof of loss. If this is refused, procure she is unable to remain here at present. one from some source and fill out, answering all questions saked, attach a copy of your inventory, stating the amount of loss, make oath to'it, and hand to the local agent, or bester vet, office of the company. Keep a copy of everything. Then the company does not have you at a disadvantage. They will have to settle within 60 days or you can bring suit, but you are prevented by a clause in the policy from bringing suit until 60 days from the filing of this formal proof of loss has expired. FEAR DAMAGE BY VOLCANO.

Latest Eruption of Vesuvius More

The most beautiful gateway of approach from the New World to the Old is in danger of irreparable marring through the eruption of Vesuvius, even if no lives are lost in the wellvarned villages about its base.

The whole mountain has shifted further west since the great eruption of 1,900 years ago buried Pompeli. What is left of the earlier mountain, now known as Monte Samma, curves like a broken sheath part way about the newer and higher cone, which is the very foreground of the matchless picture presented, with Ischia to the left and Capri to the right, as a steamer thrusts her prow into the Bay of Naples. From seventy miles away the tall mountain with its pillar of of smoke is the navigator's landmark.

The eruptions of 1897-98 did not proceed from the main summit, but burst new and smaller craters through the side wall of the mountain toward Naples, from which the dull glow of the fires was visible at night. But now the main or western crater, which for months has gleamed at intervals with baleful fires and which overlooks one of the most populous seacoasts in the world, seems to be misbehaving.
