At Kenesaw.

"An old diary," said a One Hundred and Twenty-Fifth Illinois man, "reminued are of that mysterious man off norseback at Kenesaw. This is what recorded in my diary June 19, 1864: Again ordered forward, but the John nies have gone to higher ground. We follow them up, and at night we are at the foot of a mountain, up the sides of which are skirmish pits, and near the top seems to be breastworks, with here and there embrasures for batteries. We soon know that the batteries are in place all right, and nineteen of our cannon open to reply to the rebs on the top of the mountain. At the same time a furious thunder cloud comes up and joins in the hurly burly, and such a roaring, shaking, and quaking as ensued is seldom wit That reads like it was written at the front, under the conditions stated by a soldier present and a participant. He was at the foot of Kenesaw, in Georgia, and belonged to Col. Dan McCook's brigade, all right, but when he made his record he did not ship.—Chicago Chronicle. know the name of the location.

History later made the name mem-orable; incidents of a few days laterfixed themselves on my memory, especially the charge of June 27, 1864. on the dead angle of Kenesaw, by Col. McCook's brigade. I belonged to company K. One Hundred and Twenty-Fifth Illinois. Our colonel, Oscar Harmon of Danville, Ill., was killed after Col. McCook fell while command ing and leading the brigade in the second effort to rush the works. He was within the twenty-foot line of the enemy's works. My place was on the extreme left, and after we had made the rush and during the confusion which ensued, some calling on us to go forward, others to fall back, I lay down, uncertain just what to do. In the interim I looked just in time to Gen. Charles G. Harker fall from his horse. He was the only mounted officer or person I saw. I cannot re-call the color of the horse, nor could I say as to his leading a charge. 

LENGTH OF PLATES AND SILLS.

Ceiling Joists Alone Extend Beyond the Wall.

N. E. McK .- For building 25 feet high and 30 feet wide, how much longer should the end plate be than the end sill?

The plates and sills are of the same length. If the building has a cottage roof the ceiling joist should extend twenty inches, or two feet over the wall (according to the width of cornice desired). The toe of each rafter sits on a plate spiked on the ends of the joist. The walls are built up above the ceiling joist with a plate on op for the rafters to sit on. Then passing over the birth and childhood of Jesus, the hidden years at Nazareth, the pirth and hidden years of John in the wilderness, as made familiar by the other Gospels, we enter upon the beginning of Jesus' ministry; as the Messiah.

John the Baptist was born in the summer of B. C. 5, six months before esus, probably at Hebron. His parents' names were Zacharias and Elizabeth, both of priestly descent from Aaron. John was a relative of Jesus (Luke 1:36). For thirty years he lived a retired, ascetic life in the wilds f his native land. Doubtless, during hese silent years, he had been study. ing the ancient prophecies and watching the tendencies of the times, their sins and their danger; and, in communion with God, had seen the only way of safety. Suddenly, like Elijah old, with an abruptness almost like flash of lightning from a clear sky, he appeared "a burning and shining light among the hills of Judea." His work was to bear witness to

Christ, and prepare the way for his mission of redemption. John's life from beginning to end was heroic. His very, willingness to seem a failure in order to be a success, and to do his work, was heroic. Seeming failure is often the greatest success. History has made immortal not only the men who have achieved great success but those who have been worldly failires while achieving the success of faith, of courage, of righteousness,



We herewith illustrate a foul-fattening crate, used at the Ontario Agricultural College. This crate is six feet six inches long, eighteen to twenty inches high and sixteen inches wide. It is divided into three compartments, each holding from four to five birds, according to the size of the chickens. The crate is made of slats, except the ends. The slats are usually one and a half inches wide and five-eighths inches thick.



slats in front are run up and down

and are two inches apart, to allow he chickens to put their heads through for feeding. The slats on the bottom are three-fourths inches apart, so as to admit of the droppings passing through to the ground. should be taken not to have the first bottom slat at the back fit closely against the back, as this will hold the droppings. The feeding and watering are done by means of a trough in front running the entire length of the coop. This trough is from two to three inches deep and is made of three-fourths inch lumber.—Farmers' Review.

Colds and Roup.

Roup in fowls of all kinds is very dangerous to the whole flock. hatchet is the best cure for it after the fowl's head becomes foully odor-Roup starts from colds, damp quarters, foul air, and other causes. When a_cold gets bad and runs into a form of catarrh it is then almost sure to go into roup. Burn or bury all fowls that die or are kill of it. Weak constitutional flocks are always troubled with colds and roup. Kill them off and try rew blood. A cold can be cured in a healthy fowl by an application of three or four drops of coal oil in the fowl's nostrils. Never get it in the eyes. Put enough permanganate of potash in the drinking water to color it. This is good for throat infections of all kinds and will prevent the spread of the trouble.-Farm Life.

Evil in Surplus Male Birds. Many people who raise pure blood chickens forget that they are good for anything else than to sell for breeding purposes and keep themselves poor feeding surplus male birds during the winter. Many of them that if kept until spring will not bring more than \$1 and sometimes less, if they had been sold when they were tiny broilers would have brought at least forty cents. Just consider the feed and the room, not saying anything of the time that would have been saved. A person who is well versed in the intricacles of the standard of excellency can readily pick out the birds which glaring defects, so they are not likely to kill the ones that will bring the big money. _
