MAND MEN ON BOTH SIDES IS CLAIMED.

GYAMA, THE GREAT FIGHTER, KU BOPATKIN, THE MASTERLY,

Field Marshal Oyama, reporting Sunday, says:

"Prisoners, spoils and the enemy's restimated casualties against all our forces in the Shakhe direction follow, but the prisoners, gans and spoils are increasing momentarily.
