BROWN PRIMARY SUB-STITUTE BILL BEFORE THE SENATE FOR ACTION.

KILLED HIS AGED WIFE AND THEN BLEW HIS OWN BRAINS OUT.

THE SHORTEST MURDER TRIAL EVER KNOWN IN MICHI-GAN ENDED.

The senate committee Tuesday afernoon reported the Brown substitute for the Baird primary bill. It is a strict platform bill, and applies to all political districts except judicial districts and the political district of the state. It also repeals all local primary bills. The arrangements for holding the primaries and electing delegates to the state conventions are the same as in the Double-Ivory bill. - Ended Two Lives.

Brandson Gardner, aged 65 years, closed his life in Traverse City with a terrible tragedy Monday, shooting and instantly killing his wife and then turning the 38-caliber revolver on himshooting himself through the temple, dying instantly. The tragedy occurred in the home of ex-Mayor Fulghum, Mrs. Gardner being the mother of Mrs. Fulghum, with whom she was living. The couple were divorced ten years ago, the facts lead-ing to the divorce not being known, and Gardner went to Lafayette, Ind., and up to two weeks ago had not been seen in Traverse City

Mrs. Gardner and her daughter were alone in the house, when someone knocked at the front door. Mrs. Fulghum went to the door and opened it, when a man wearing a mask pushed his way in and asked for the man of the house. Mrs. Fulghum ran to the street screaming for help and immedi-ately heard two reports from a revolver, and fell fainting to the walk. When the neighbors arrived they found that Gardner had dragged his wife to the kitchen and shot her. He then tore off

the mask and, placing a revolver at each temple, shot himself. The double charge literally tore off the top of Gardner's head. It is believed the man Mrs. Gardner was a gentle, refined

woman of 58 years, who moved in the best social circles, and her tragic death was a shock to her many friends. She had neve: heard from her husband since he went away, 10 years ago. The Shortest on Record.





"At each corner of the paved area over the tomb stands a sculptured stone taken from some ancient lodging place to do honor to the memory of the dead emperor. One of these stones is eight feet high and is covered with allegorical figures, inscriptions and hieroglyphics: another of the stones represents a prince, a third a wise man and the fourth a woman, who is minus her head.

"The Otomites sacrificed the lives of their victims by casting their bodies from the top of the tower through the hole which formed the center of the structure from top to bottom. The bodies fell into the subterranean rassage under the tower. Otemite In-

I am advised by the state dairy bureau that the production of butter in the state for 1904 will reach west nigh 40,000,000 pounds or almost thirty pounds per capita of our population."

HIS DEAL WITH ASTOR. Troubles of Aaron Burr Traced in Old Records.

Under Aaron Burr and his brilliant daughter, Theodosia, Richmond Hill became the most famous place of hospitality in New York, says Burton J. Hendrick. Talleyrand, Jerome Bonaparte and Louis Philippe were entertained there. John Jacob Astor, how-ever, was not charmed by its literary political associations, or its natural beauty. But he did see that the city was inching up to Richmond Hill, and that it would soon be needed for building lots. Richmond Hill, too, was heavily mortgaged-the mortgage payable in July, 1804. About this time Burr became involved in his with Hamilton. His letters to Theodosia show that the sale of Richmond Hill was the only possible way of forestalling ruin. So, as his mortgage became due, and just one month before the Hamilton duel, Astor bought the place for \$160,000. Unquestionably this money facilitated Burr's flight; perhaps it was used, who in his wild Southwestern Burr returned to New York after his miserable wanderings in Europe, but never succeeded in rehabilitating himself. 
