Letter to Attorney-General.

The criticisms of the valuations of eneral and railroad properties made by the state board of tax commissionors under the Galbraith equalization law, have resulted in an open letter to Attorney-General Bird, who recently began suit to have the law declared imconstitutional. The letter follows: Hon. John E. Bird, Attorney-General,

Lansing, Mich .: Dear Sir-We notice in the dally ress of the state that the result reached by the state board of assessors n fixing the values of the ratiroac properties of the state and in deter nining the rate of taxation for the same was in your opinion more favor-

able to the railroads than can be jus tified by the facts. We also notice an interview given in

the public press by your deputy, Mr. Harry E. Chase, which presumably has your indorsement, stating that cer-tain ratiroad properties were undervalued. It is evident from the interview that your department is in possession of important facts relative to session of important facts relative to the valuation of the railroads of the state not known to the state board of assessors. However, there is still ample opportunity to make the showing. Werdo not claim any such degree of infallibility as is asserted in certain quarters, and we used our honest judgment in arriving at our published on.

quarters, and we used our honest judgment in arriving at our published conclusions. If it can be shown that errors of judgment have been made, there is still ample opportunity to correct all errors. The state board of assessors will be in session in the city of Lansing until February 15, 1996, as a board of review and we believe that in fairness to us and to the state you should come before the board and give us the facts upon which your published opinions have been based. We shall be more than pleased to fix a time satisfactory to yourself for a public hearing at which all parties interested may be at which all parties interested may be present and the whole matter of val-ues and rate thoroughly examined. Gov. Warner desires a hearing and

no doubt a time convenient to both can be arranged.
The statement has been made that the condition of affairs which allows the state board of assessors to fix one rate for the general properties of the state and another for the railroad properties is intolerable. The state board of assessors, as you know, does not presume to fix the rate for the general properties, as that is done by the local authorities. In arriving at the rate for the taxation of railroads the board is given authority by the Galbraith law to "ascertain and determine" the cash value of all the property of the state. These men have not only the ingenuity of criminal lawyers, but they are corporation law-yers—trust lawyers."

MARSHALL FIELD.

Marshall Field, the Chicage merchant paines who died in New York on Wednesday of passamenia, made a brave fight against death. He was a melf-made man who began life as a poor toy, dying at the age of 70 goars and beaving a fortune estimated at \$175,000,000. Mr. Field was the insect taxpayer in the United States.

Like meany another American who rose to prominence in the world, Marshall Field was born on a New Bagland farm. His birthpince was the town of Conway, Mass., and M he had lived natif next August he would have reached the age of 71. He got the meager common school education of his generation and had the further advantage of another interaction. his generation and had the further advantage of academical instruction until he was 17.

that Marshall Field was considered un suited for a mercantile career by so some an authority as the dry goods storekeeper in Pittsfield, who pronounced him a flat failure and declined to keep him in his employ. Young Field found his opportunity in the growing town of Chicago, which he reached when he was just of age. He went into the store of Cooley, Wadsworth & Co. and inside of four years he was made a partner in the business.
