# About Skirt Linings.

Few of the skirts this year lined, or, if a lining is used, it is in the form of a drop skirt or petticoat, and is often made separate from the outer skirt, having its own waistband and placket closing.

In neutral colors or black, one lining skirt may be worn with different forms a panel in front, making the outside skirts, though, unless the massimall wearer appear tall, and its counoutside skirts, though, unless the material of the gown is transparent, the lining skirt is replaced by one of the colored petticoats of silk or its imitations, now so generally worn.

The flat-lined skirt, as it is called when skirt and lining are made in one, is scarcely ever seen; its return has been rumored, but it seems hardly likely to find much favor, as a skirt of this sort is always heavy. It is true that so much cloth and so much lining have probably the same actual weight weather made together or separately, but the unlined skirt worn over the foundation petticoat is apparently much lighter and certainly more gráceful.
