### Neither Side Confident.

The reason that no agreement has yet been reached for a vote on the railroad rate bill in the senate is that neither side yet feels confident of having enough votes to win. There are fifty-five active Republicans in the senate and thirty-three Democrats, a to-tal of eighty-eight votes. Any closely contested proposition, therefore, requires, forty-five votes to succeed. Neither Senator Tillman, who is in charge of the rate bill from the house, which is indorsed in its main features by the president, nor the conservative senators headed by Aldrich, Knox and Spooner, are yet satisfied that either side has those forty-five votes corral-

led.

The two main issues are the scope if of the possible proceedings in count, after the interstate commerce commissions and sion has decided that a certain rail-road rate is unjust, and whether, pending litigation in court, the decision of the interstate commerce commission shall remain in effect or not.

### House Work






