Golden had been in his store with friends, and left for his house, a short distance away. His companions started in the other direction, and had gone but a few rods when they heard Golden cry and then two revolver shots. Running back they found the man lying on the ground with a bullet hole in his head. The murderer had escaped.

THE RAILROADS PAYING THE STATE PAST DUE TAXES.

THE INTEREST CAUSES DELAY ON THE PART OF ONE OF THE CORPORATIONS.

PORTION OF THE PENALTY IS QUESTIONED AND MAY NOT BE COLLECTED.

Railroads Pay Up.

Practically every railroad company in the state has now paid its taxes and penalties to the state of Michigan under the provisions of the new ad valorem tax law except the Michigan Central and the Pere Marquette. One modification of this statement should be made with reference to the Lake Shore Railroad Co., and a few of the smaller roads have yet to send in their checks.

The Lake Shore Co. claims irregularities with reference to the notice re-ceived regarding the taxes of 1902, and has withheld payment of taxes for that year for the present. The company several days ago paid its taxes for 1905, and today it paid: \$253,575.22 for the taxes of 1903 and \$21,750.96 for 1904, both came including the penal-ties provided for by the statute.

As to the 1902 assessment, it is

claimed that notice of the assessment was not received until May 22, and that the state cannot collect the pen-

alty for the non-payment of the tax for the months of May and June. It will be remembered that on ac-count of the first assessment for that year having been declared invalid by the supreme court, a new assessment was made by the court's order, and the delay made it impossible to notify the company of the amount of its second assessment within the time specified by law. The company is apparently willing to pay the tax for the year. The legal question involved is being looked up by the attorney-general and by the company's officials but eral and by the company's officials, but in case the company's contention is found to be correct it will amount to less than \$4,000.

AND BETTER CITY. In the face of the enormous loss and the complete wiping out of the com-mercial life of the empire city of the Pacific coast, the leaders of trade and

San Francisco is but a memory. It San Francisco is out a memory. It is hopeless to attempt to describe the conditions which exist, where but a few days ago a tarking city nestled on the shores of the Pacific. Every bank, every hotel, every business house, all the theaters, the municipal as though a scourge had passed over the land.

The rich and poor have suffered

alike Fortunes have been wiped out. The palaces of the rich, together with the hovels of the poor, have alike succumbed, and San Francisco may be likened to a broad stretch of land offer-ing a fair site for a city which the early settlers in the days of the fortyniners belield when the first rude hill was thrown up on the site of the met-ropolis of the coast.

Thousands of San Francisco's home-

less slept in the open if they slept at all—in a drenching rain Sunday night, adding untold misery and suffering to those whose cup is already full. Shortly after midnight it began to rain and continued for three hours, from a drizzle at times to a heavy downpour for a few minutes. At 6 o'clock Mon day morning the rain began to fall again with all indications of continnance. The rain cooled the ruins and extinguished some of the fires which still illuminated the sky from the ruins

of the city. The fire, which seemed to have died out Sunday, broke out with renewed vigor in the coal bunkers north of the Ferry building shortly after midnight. It had these bunkers Saturday, but was apparently checked after a hard fight although the blaze stubbernly resisted all efforts of the firemen to extinguish it. Early Monday morning the fire was burning flercely.







suls general. While congress did not authorize in this measure the practical civil service recommended by Secretary Root, it is understood that the policy of the administration will be to adopt civil service methods in future appointments. Already they have required candidates for appointments to pass an examination fully as rigid as the civil service commission would de vise. The president has let it be known also that after this bill becomes a law the appointments in the furnire will be only to the grades of consul and that the higher places will be filled by promotion as

There is another reform that has not yet been accomplished, but which being strongly urged by business organizations and those who demand that the American consular service shall be filled by Americans. In an address recently submitted to congress by Minister Barratt on the subject of "Americans needed as vice and dep-uty consuls," he tells the following rather startling facts: Of 60 consulates general, 20, or one-third, have vice or deputy consuls who are not Americans. Of 225 consulates, 113, or half, have vice or deputy consuls who are not Americans either by naturalization or residence. 
