MICHIGAN EVENTS NOTED

STARTLED THE POLICE WITH STORY OF HIS MANY CRIMES.

SAGINAW YOUTH OWNS UP Worked as a Clerk Days and Was a Fearless Crackman at Night, So He Says.

Chose Life of a Crook.

"I am the man you are looking for, and I've got a lot of things to tell you about," said Byron Lumby, a flaxen-haired English youth of 19, as he walked into Saginaw police headquarters...

He admitted first that the satchel of burglar's tools found back of Calum's flouring mill, which contained a complete kit ranging from a dark lantern to dynamite and keys, to explosives, belonged to him.

He said he had cracked the Carlisle tannery safe, doing the job alone; that with two other young men, who stood guard, he robbed the safe of Fred Gill of \$43, and with the same pair had committed the burglary of the Peter Marvett's office in Grand Rapids.

Lumby said he began his career as a burglar only a few weeks ago. Throughout it all he kept his position with the lumber company, working during the day, exchanging his business suit for a laborer's attire in the evening, and salting forth at night in his disguise, equipped with the crackman's outfit for more lucrative employment.

His father finally learned of the dual life he was living and persuaded him to give himself up and make a clean breast of everything.

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ALLEGED CARRIERS IMPOSE BURDENS

SHIPPER DEMAND RELIEF FROM EXCESSIVE CHARGES FOR SWITCHING.

Texas Cattle Raisers Request Interstate Board to Take Up Case Decided in Their Favor by Commission but Reversed by Court.

Washington, Sept. 1.—Shippers of the country are taking advantage of the new railroad freight rate law to seek relief from the interstate commerce commission for what they regard as unreasonable or unjust conditions imposed upon them by the railroad companies.

Alleged Charge is Excessive.

The Texas Cattle Raisers' association, of Texas, entered a complaint against the Missouri, Kansas & Texas railway and many other railroad corporations because of a charge of \$2 a car on live stock made by the terminal railroad at Chicago.

Decides for Shippers.

The interstate commerce commission decided several years ago that the charge of \$2 a car, as a transfer or terminal rate in Chicago, was excessive. It fixed \$1 a car as the proper tariff.

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TRADE PROGRESS KEEPS UP

OUTLOOK GROWS BRIGHTER AS THE WEEKS PASS BY.

Encouraging Crop Reports Main Factor Behind Feeling of Confidence in the Business World.

New York, Sept. 1.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Review of Trade, says: No check to commercial progress can be discerned, while the outlook becomes brighter each week through most encouraging crop reports.

Jobbing trade is on a large scale, wholesale business is much better than last year, and after the holiday retail distribution of fall merchandise promises to be very heavy.

Manufacturing reports are gratifying beyond precedent, the textile industries alone showing any irregularity.

As to cotton goods, there is a natural disposition to delay placing orders when better terms seem warranted by the cheaper raw material, but producers make no concessions because of contracts on hand.

When goods also hesitate, pending a more definite trend in the distributing markets.

These uncertainties apply to future business, current trade being of good volume.

Higher prices for pig iron emphasize the inadequacy of furnace output, steel mills being embarrassed by lack of material.

Similar conditions prevail in the footwear industry, the average of hide prices now eclipsing all previous records.

Lower prices for farm staples testify to the certainty of ample crops, which in turn give promise of more liberal exports.

Foreign commerce at this port alone for the last week showed gains of \$2,356,709 in exports and \$2,548,879 in imports, as compared with last year's figures.

Railway traffic returns continue encouraging for August thus far exceeding last year's figures by 17.5 per cent.

Failures for the week numbered 170 in the United States compared with 217 last year, and 14 in Canada against 19 a year ago.
