It was the statement of a member of the state department of agriculture, recently publicly made, that one-fourth of the farmers send their milk to the butter and cheese factories with enough bacteria to contaminate the supply contributed by the other three-fourths. The issue of cleanliness and healthfulness in milk supplied direct to the consumer is an exceedingly vital one, but one also to which the average consumer does not give sufficient concern. 



Boat and Raft of Lost Steamer Valencia and Eight Skeletons Found in Cave on Pacific Coast-Rock Barred Egress.

Victoria, B. C.-A dispatch from Carmanah respecting the finding of a lifeboat and a pontoon from the steamer Valencia in caves with eight skeletons has been supplemented by a later message from the lighthouse keeper at Carmanah, which throws further light on the find. He does not indicate where the cave is located or who has made the find, but his descrip tion of the situation indicates that there is a possibility that the skeleons are those of a band less fortunate even than those who remained on the Valencia and went down to certain death. His information gives rise to the possibility that the eight persons represented by the skeletons now discovered were caught in a trap, surounded by high stone wall, and

here starved to death. The cave in which the boat and the skeletons were found is described as barred at the entrance by a large rock. The passage on either side of this rock is far too narrow to permit of the boat being taken out that way. Apparently the boat got in by being washed over the top of the obstructing rock on the crest of a great wave. Once behind the rock access to the open sea was cut off, even when the water subsided, as it was impossible to get the boat past the harrier. The prisoners were also wailed in from freedom on the land side and must there have perished for lack of

food. The boat is not damaged except for a small hole in the forward air cham-ber near the gunwale. To take it out of its place will require a strong force of men. The light keeper says: too short-handed here to do austhing."

The cave is apparently a gathering place of debris, as the lighthouse keep-er says that in order to make an atempt at identifying the skeletons it would be necessary to remove several tons of rubbish which had since accumulated, and with that accomplished something might be found within the cave which would give a clue as to the identity of the unfortunate refugees who perished in the







PAY OF STATESMEN.

Denmark is Stinglest of All with Her Legislators.

The Ne-wegian member of parliament gets only 13 shillings a day, and if the hard-working legislator takes him. The latter thought he detected a day off he loses his pay, says London Answers. The same is the case with members of the Swiss diet. They are rewarded with 16 shillings a day, on condition that they do not absen themselves from work.

To go fulther east, we find that Roumania thinks her lawmakers worth one pound sterling a day. Sixteen shillings a day is the salary of hose who compose the Bulgarian sobranje, but members who live in the capital get 12 shillings daily.

Denmark is about the stinglest of all European countries, so far as remunerating her lawmakers is concerned. Danish members of parliament get but six shillings eight pence a day; but, on the other hand, they have the odd privilege of a free seat in the Royal theater at Copen

hagen.
While the members of the German reichstag are not salaried, yet the lawmakers of the various German states do not work for nothing. -Saxe-Coburg members of parliament are paid 13 shillings, of Bavaria ten, and

At first sight Hungary seems to do Her lawmaking on the cheap plan, for her members get £200 a year in cash. But they are not so badly off, after into the bargain for house rent. Austria-Hungary's two legislative assemblies cost the country about £160,00 a year in all. Both the Austrian and Hungarian legislators can travel firstclass with second-class tickets: Besides the United Kingdom, Italy

and Spain are the only countries which pay nothing to their members of parliament. Nevertheless, the cost of the Italian parliament is estimated at £85,000 a year.
